

LAWYERS ARMED. Both Prosecution and Defence Fear Outbreak on Part of Callahan's Associates—"Band" Will Be Searched. Witnesses and Spectators Alike to Surrender Weapons—Story of the Feud Told in Court.

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—Never have so many prominent part in a court room in this city as in the trial of Thomas Callahan, charged with the murder of James Irving, which is going on before Judge McMahon in general sessions. There have been placed in evidence by the prosecution; others will be introduced by the defence.

But Callahan knew what was coming, and, quicker than Irving, he shot three times at him, but the latter got his revolver from his pocket. The bullets took effect, the other ploughed a hole in Irving's overcoat. All this was in May last, and Irving was in a hospital for some weeks before he died. Soon afterward his brother Edward was shot by another of Callahan's friends, Tom Woods, who is now in Sing Sing.

Callahan's plea is that he shot Irving in self-defence, but himself would have been killed if he had not been quicker with his revolver than was Irving. The prosecution ended its case yesterday and Mr. Conroy will open the defence today. One of the jurors will decide Callahan's fate is Frederick S. Church, one of the best known artists in this country.

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SEVENTY-ONE BODIES Brought to the Surface from the Pittsburgh Mine. List of Dead Is Over 170, and These Figures May Be Increased by Still Later Reports.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Jan. 27.—Three days have elapsed since the terrible catastrophe at the Harwick mine of the Allegheny Coal Company and tonight at midnight 71 bodies have been brought to the surface. Only eighteen have been identified.

The Allegheny Coal Company tonight in an official statement admitted that all of the men who were in the mine when the explosion occurred are dead. There are 171 names on the list, which does not include Selwyn M. Taylor, or of the two men who were on the tipple above the mine shaft when the explosion came. Nor does the list include Daniel Lyote of Castle Shannon, whose body was found in the mine this morning.

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ESCAPE AFTER BEATING JAILER. Prisoners Pound Him, Saying "Sorry, but Have to."

SACO, Me., Jan. 27.—After a desperate battle in the city prison tonight, Joseph Bradley and John King of Providence, R. I., who were this afternoon each sentenced to a year's imprisonment for breaking and entering and larceny in South Berwick, overpowered Jailer Frank Murphy, and after locking him in a cell, made their escape.

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—Three trolley cars of the West Chester avenue line of the Union Railway in the Bronx and a truck laden with heavy steel girders figured in a smashup tonight, in which half a dozen persons were injured, three so seriously that they were removed to Lebanon hospital. The accident happened on a steep hill. Owing to the darkness the motor-man did not see the truck, laden with several heavy girders, until he was close upon it and was powerless to stop his car. The momentum was so great that the car was torn asunder.
