Lated by Telegraph from London to Liverpool—London, Saturday Morning.—The Times City article says the funds opened Friday morning at a decline of one eighth, and subsequently experienced a further fall, owing to speculative sales, consequent upon the unsettled state of feeling in Paris, likely to be increased by the trial of the conspirators. Applications for discount at the Bank to day have slightly increased, but continued very moderate.

The Daily News city article says the Stock Markets on Friday were weaker.

The funds after sustaining an extreme reaction of one half per cent., closed at 3.75s

per cent. lower than Thursday. The market is to an unusual excited influence by the Paris Bourse, which exhibits a gradual decline.

Movements. Announces.—Mr. D'Israeli

has sighted his address to the electors of Bucks, offering himself the fifth time for re-election.

The following passage occurs in his address:—“The circumstances of the country are in my present opinion critical, and in none more so than in its external relations.

Painful misconceptions have risen with the government of that faithful and powerful

ally, who in my instances have saved his

good feeling and fidelity to this country.

Believing that a cordial alliance between

England and France is equally conducive

to the interest of both countries, I shall ex-

press my hope and conviction that by mea-

sures of a firm and conciliatory, these

causes of misunderstanding may be spe-

cifically and entirely removed.

If the country

will heartily support the Queen's Govern-

ment at his co-operation, the result so desir-

able for the peace and progress of Europe

will be greatly facilitated.”

Sir J. Packington addresses the electors of Dorwick. No opposition is expected.

After announcing that he had joined Lord

Derby's Cabinet, he says:—“It is essential

to the well working of our system of Par-

liamentary Government that people should

not suppose there is only one man who

could be entrusted with public interests.”

The China mail of yesterday has brought

commerce by far the largest proportion of

gold imported here will be sent to the con-

tinent as fast as it comes in; but it does

not imply that the stock of bullion in the

Bank has yet reached its highest point.

Advanced from Calcutta are all respects

satisfactory. Government securities had

risen 4 to 5 per cent., and although 5 per

cents were still quoted as low as 10 per

cent discount, confidence amongst native

holders was evidently reviving.

We understand that Kennedy who was
