MEETINGS THE PATENT MEDICINE **ACT TODAY**

The Dominion Act relating to patent medicines, etc., comes in force today. It contains a provision forbidding the distribution of samples of pills and patent medicines and many important regulations of particular interest to druggists. All special preparations and imported prescriptions must be registered with the Minister of Inland Revenue.

The labels of all these prescriptions must contain the name and number of the prescription and the name and address of the manufacturer or his Canadian agent. Any prescription containing poison must be labelled poison and all preparations containing cocaine or alcohol in any larger quantity than is necessary as a solvent or preservative, and many others shall not be sold without a certificate of the minister. The new regulations will lessen the number of proprietary, medicines now on the market.
