Oruro has New Shaft — Two Tugs Damaged in Harbor — Digby Gets Away Safely.

TWO TUGS DAMAGED.
Two tugs were put out of commission Sunday during the work of locating the buckets lost from the dredge. The tugboats were damaged in the collision with the dredge.

YARMOUTH PACKET SOLD.

Henry C. V. Townsend, of Louisville, has purchased the schooner Yarmouth Packet from Parker, Perkins, Ltd., and will use her in the coal business around the Cape Breton shores and to the island. He arrived last Monday, and has since been engaged in mending sails and getting the vessel in readiness for sea. He wanted to get away this week, but found it impossible to ship a crew here, and had to telegraph to Louisville for men. The vessel will clear for Halifax, where she will pick up a general cargo for Louisville.

ANOTHER SHAFIT FOR ORURO.

From Jamaica and Turk's Island, the Pickford and Black chartered steamer Anita is due with freight. With a full cargo, the Briardene sails for the West Indies on Monday. Yesterday afternoon the Oruro left St. John and is due today. At St. John she had eight first class and 62 second class passengers. Many of the second class were colored people, eight or ten of whom are bound to the United States and the remainder will make their homes in Canada. The Oruro also brought twelve soldiers and twelve sailors from Bermuda bound to the old country. The Oruro was delayed for quite a long while at St. John yesterday for a new one to be fitted at Halifax—Halifax Herald.

COMING AGAIN WITH SUGAR.

The tramp steamer Melina, which arrived at Halifax Thursday afternoon with 10,500 bags of raw sugar, will return to San Domingo for another cargo to be delivered at Halifax.

DIGBY GOT AWAY SAFELY.

Early Monday morning a cable was received that the new Purpure liner Digby had cast off her moorings at Liverpool Thursday afternoon at two o'clock. It is not reported whether she will call at St. John's on the way out to Halifax. If the Digby comes out direct she will, it is expected, establish a record for the transatlantic voyage by Purpure liners.

LARGE FISHERMAN FITTING OUT.

In Halifax and fitting out for the banks is the Leifhave schooner John Parker, a brand new vessel launched last autumn at Leifhave for Captain James Richards. She is a well fitted craft of 97 tons and has spacious accommodation. Her design, says the crew, is of the "round bow" type. She carries 26 fishermen and 20 tons of gear, and leaves next Wednesday on her initial banking trip.
