**MANY GROSS CRUELITIES
WERE PRACTICED BY ALL**

Greeks Used Dum-dum Bullets

But Bulgarians Were Leaders in Deeds of Cruelty — Servian Action Hampers Enquiry.

Parliament, 23—Troops of all the warring Balkan States committed atrocities, according to the evidence gathered by the International Carnegie Commission in its searching inquiry just ended. The conclusion of the commission are to be published in book form by the United States Government, a number of the documents on which the report is based. In view of the commission's desire to present an absolutely impartial account of the investigations, the text will not be divided into sections written by individual members, but issued as a whole for which all the members of the commission are responsible.

One of the noteworthy tasks was

packet of letters from Greek soldiers captured by the Bulgarians, containing the horrible story of how the Bulgarians avenged themselves, the Bulgarians who fell into their hands. The commission believes it has established the authenticity of these letters, and that the Bulgarians did indeed occasionally make use of the forbidden dum-dum bullet and show also the misdeeds of Bulgarian and other belligerents. The inquiry did not even touch the commission's collection made from every available source. After it visited officials, the commission went to the scenes of alleged atrocities and interrogated at length every man, woman and child who took part in the battles to women and children who were spectators and victims of the horrors. Some of the most important evidence taken by the commission is said to have come from children.

While it was found that the Bulgarians had committed the greatest fault, the soldiers of other nations took part in the war were also guilty of many hideous acts. The commissaries, who were to be of the opinion that had other belligerents been roused to such a pitch of fury as were the Bulgarians, they would not have a much better, judging from what happened on certain occasions and by the capture of Greek soldiers.

In Bulgaria where the opinion was that the Bulgarians were being treated by the foreign press and the belligerents scarcely blamed for the misdeeds, the fullest inquiry was made and every possible facility of investigation was given to the mission.
