**Special Ambassador Says His  
Country Had No Selfish In-  
terests in Sending Mission.**

Washington, Aug. 27.—Viscount Ishii, the special Japanese ambassador, gave to the Associated Press tonight a statement defining the purpose of his mission. He said that the members of the mission noticed at Honolulu, at San Francisco and finally here in Washington, that the Japanese coming might be misinterpreted by certain elements, and it was felt necessary to explain that no compromise would be made and that would not be subverted. The ambassador said: "The imperial Japanese mission came to the United States for three reasons: first, to convey to the president and to the American people their appreciation and congratulations for the victory of the United States for the entrance of the United States into the war as allies of Japan and the other allied nations; second, to demand the enemies of freedom; second, to determine how best to cooperate with the United States in crushing the war to a triumphant conclusion."

"Bombing raids and observation work for the artillery were carried out vigorously yesterday by our planes. The enemy's batteries, transport and infantry were effectively engaged with machine gun fire. During the fine intervals the enemy

aircraft were active and aggressive. In the air fighting four German airplanes were brought down; three others were driven down out of control. Two of our machines are missing."
