THE THUNDER DRUM.

The thunder you hear at the theatre or the motion picture house is produced by means of the "thunder drum" which is also used to make that rumbling so necessary for war scenes. It consists of a substantial wooden frame about fifty inches square and seven inches deep, with an extra thick and heavy skin stretched across it. This drum is properly suspended behind the scenes, and the head is lightened by the host of electric lamps or coils of a special kind of wire. Then when the sound of peals of thunder or deep rumblings are required, the drum is repeatedly struck with soft drum sticks which imitate the sounds called for remarkably well.

LANCASTER RED CROSS.

The Lancaster Red Cross Branch held its semi-annual business meeting on Monday evening. The Secretary reported a large shipment sent to Halifax in December, and the following shipped through Provincial Branch: hospital shirts 211, pyjama suits 132, quilts 6; personal property bags 132; crocheted neckties 71; bed jackets 3; bed socks 18; handkerchiefs 437; shippers 20 pairs; towels 694; pillow cases 168; socks 1,494 pairs. The Treasurer reported \$4,011.53 raised; \$3,390.08 by the seniors, and \$621.45 by the juniors. By this amount there were 19 new life memberships; collections, \$738.55; donations \$791.10; Dipper Harbor \$75. designated for Halifax, and \$124.50 special gift for Nursing Sister Dunham to buy extras for the boys in Hospital in France. All life members except Mrs. O. E. Leahy have been reported. Owing to illness the work from Dipper Harbor circles could not be counted in this month. 408 pairs of socks were by special donation sent to the C. W. C. A., making a total of 1,812 pairs of socks from this Society. A detailed statement of each circle's work will be fully reported at the Annual.

At the meeting of St. George's Society held last night arrangements were completed for the celebration of St. George's Day, April 23. As was the case last year a Flag Day will be held with the assistance of the Y. W. P. A., and the proceeds will be handed over to the Navy League. The annual church service will be held in Trinity church on Sunday, April 21. The sum of \$25 was voted to DeMonts Chapter for the Maple Sugar Fund and \$25 will be sent to Rev. Major Hooper for his hospital work, to reach him on St. George's Day.
