NUSTRIANS FORCED TO WITHDRAW NORTH OF MT. BELLUNE RAILWA

Enemy Launches Fresh Attack on Piave With Strong Forces and Succeeds in Gaining Ground in Front of Zenson, But Is Forced To Retire Later-French Storm Asiago - Italians Capture Costalunga — Austrians Short of Food and Many in Rags.

Rome, June 20-From the Montello to the sea the battle of the Piave river is continuing bitterly without pause, the Itakian war office announced today. Last night the Italians forced the invaders to withdraw their whole front north a of the Monte Belluno railway. More than 1,200 Austrian prisoners were taken and numerous machine guns were captured.

The Austrians yesterday afternoon, says the statement, launched a fresh attack on the Piave with strong forces and succeeded at first in gaining some ground in front of Zenson. Later Italian reserves were brought up and forced the Austrians to retire. French forces on the Asiago Plateau stormed the Austrian positions at Bertigo and Pennar.






