

### Arrangements For The Celebration

Committees Report Every Person Busy in Preparation for the Two Big Days—Governor of Maine is Expected Tomorrow.

Only two more days before the grand celebration in honor of the soldier boys and the visit of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, and the different committees have their work well in hand.

The next rehearsal of the school children will be on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock, and all those who are to take part are requested to bring their badges with them. The children from West St. John are requested to leave on the 9:30 trip of the ferry instead of 8:40 so they will be in time for the rehearsal in the High School, which will be accompanied by the G. W. V. A. band.

All old members of the Polymorphian Club who have not so far attended meetings, are asked to be present at a final meeting in the Victoria Bowling Academy, Wednesday evening, at eight o'clock.

The firemen are all busy decorating their floats for the big parade, as are all other organizations and business firms, who have decided to take part.

A wire was received yesterday by the secretary of the parade committee from the chief of the Old Town Fire department that he would arrive in St. John Wednesday night with twenty-five of his men to take part in the parade and the welcome to the Prince.

In addition to this body from Maine there are twenty-five firemen coming from Houlton. Nine men from the Yarmouth, N. S. department arrived last evening on the steamer North Cann. They brought a hose cart with them and started in to work decorating this piece of apparatus.

The remainder of the party, numbering forty in all, will arrive tomorrow afternoon on the steamer Empress. Definite word regarding the Moncton department will be received this afternoon.

Governor of Maine. It is expected that the Governor of Maine with his party will arrive in the city tomorrow night to be present during the two holidays to take part as the guest of Lieut-Governor Pursey.

Information re Thursday's Parade. The fine weather with which this week has commenced and a continuation of such which everybody is earnestly hoping for, has greatly increased the enthusiasm in the celebrations of Thursday and Friday.

On all sides one hears the remark: "Won't it be great if the weather continues for the soldier boys and the Prince?"

The secretary of the parade committee is authority for the statement that St. John can settle back for a regular old time procession—a complete return to those days when community spirit ran high in the old town and each one vied with his neighbor in constructing ornamental floats or spectacular tableaux, either humorous or serious. Close to fifty motor and horse-drawn vehicles are entered in the procession so far, while contrary to the request of the committee others are holding back their entries to give rivals a surprise as the cash awards for the best get up have proven an incentive on all sides.

It is already assured that a party of twenty-five firemen will come from Houlton, Me., another twenty-five from Oldtown, Me., forty firemen from Yarmouth, N. S., and a party of twenty-five from Moncton, N. B.

Decorations for the celebration are already appearing. The Market building on Charlotte street went into the hands of a large crew last evening and it looks as if there would be a very attractive display on these large frontages.

Electrical decoration is going to grace a number of the big King Street firms, notably Brook and Paterson Limited.

Imperial Theatre stage and work shops are filled with some splendid work to be installed on the stage tomorrow, chiefly the handiwork of F. W. Stringer, Imperial's artist, recently returned from the front.

The west side of the King Square is already taking shape as to decorations. A row of masts have been erected on the green mound with large shields bearing the royal coat of arms, surmounted by a large crown and bearing such national floral devices as maple leaves, shamrock, rose and thistle. The framework of large arch is also in place surrounding the drinking fountain and when completed will be a very pretty structure along the street, a triumphal arch in imitation stone.

### BRAKEMAN HAS NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH

Lost Balance and Fell from Car Steps But Fortunately Escaped Going Under Wheels.

Special to The Standard. Moncton, Aug. 10.—Murray Carter, brakeman on a C. N. R. troop car, had a narrow escape from death Sunday morning, as the result of falling from the train as it was passing Cahoun's Mills. Brakeman Carter, who is a returned man, was standing on the steps of a car and lost his balance, falling backwards. Fortunately he was struck by the car steps and pushed clear of the wheels, otherwise his life would probably have been crushed out. Brakeman Carter sustained a badly injured knee and was otherwise bruised. He will be laid up a long time and may be permanently injured as the injury was the same knee struck by shrapnel while in France.

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### EXPERTS EXAMINE INTO CAUSE OF BIG EXPLOSION

Belief That Spontaneous Combustion Produced the Wreck of Grain Elevator at Fort Colborne.

Fort Colborne, Ont., August 11.—Various boards of experts, sent here by the governments of the United States and Canada, today continued their investigation into the cause of the explosion here Saturday, which caused the death of ten persons, and the injury of twenty others, and the destruction of the two million dollar government elevator, and the sinking of the grain barge Quebec.

It is generally accepted now that the explosion was the result of spontaneous combustion in the huge elevator. Methods to prevent a repetition of the disaster in any of the scores of similar elevators on the continent, will be formulated by the experts now on the grounds.
