DISTRICT AND GENERAL

Only four citizens voted against the hydro-electric by-law in Alvinston. Elgin county rate for this year has been fixed at 8 1/2 mills, as against 8 mills last year.

The late Donald Morrison, who died at the home of his son in Port Huron, was one of the pioneer settlers in West Williams, coming there in 1849.

Duncan McColl, one of the well-known pioneer residents of Aldborough township, died at his home near Rodney a few days ago in his 78th year.

If both parties, by mutual consent, break an engagement to marry, the man is entitled to the engagement ring, an Ashbury Park (N. J.) court ruled.

A twelve per cent. reduction will be made in the wages of Canadian railway employees on July 1st. The number of men to whom the decrease applies is 150,000.

A Coatesville, Pa., contractor engaged on street work for the city refuses to start work on daylight saving time, claiming that his horses do not get enough sleep.

Parcel post rates outside the 20-mile radius in Ontario have been increased and are now 10 cents for the first pound and 5 cents for each succeeding pound up to 11 pounds.

The marriage took place at the manse, Dorchester, on Wednesday, June 8, of Miss Alene Brown, daughter of Mrs. Jennie Brown of Dutton, and Bert McCallum of Dunwich.

Motor license plates for the year 1922 will have white background with the black numbers a little larger than this year. The embossed feature of the 1921 plates will be continued on the 1922 plates.

Unable to rent a flat or house where she was welcome with four children, a Covington, Ky., woman has considered trading her four children for as many dogs because she finds that they are allowed by landlords.

Damage amounting to between \$20,000 and \$30,000 was done to the stock in the warehouse of the Buntin-Gillies Company, wholesale stationers, Hamilton, by water from a tap which had been carelessly left running over night.

Ross & Bikel, acting for Eugene Gallagher, have issued a writ against the Grand Trunk Railway for \$800 damages, which their client claims for alleged breach of contract in the carrying and delivery of potatoes from Strathroy to Windsor in June, 1920.

Owing to industrial conditions the Massey-Harris factory at Brantford, which has been in continuous operation during the past six years, will be compelled to close during the summer. The employees will be available for work on the farm during the harvest season.

The monument to the heroes from Brooke and Alvinston who fell in the Great War will be unveiled on Wednesday, June 29. Rev. J. M. McGillivray of St. Thomas, chaplain of the Canadian forces while overseas, will have charge of the ceremonies and will be assisted by others of high military rank.

The Glorious Twelfth this year will be a big day in London, Ont. Between 10,000 and 15,000 followers of William of Orange will assemble on that day to help commemorate his victory over James at the Boyne. Orangemen will be in the city from all parts of Western Ontario, as well as most of the cities in Michigan, and the celebration will have a distinctly international flavor.

The Supreme Court of Maine, has just decided that where the dining room of a hotel is infested with flies, a guest is justified in refusing to remain at the hotel and justified in refusing to pay the bill for which he has contracted. The opinion holds that the house fly is the most repulsive and dangerous of insects and distributes the germs of almost every deadly form of contagion.

Eight students have been expelled from the University of Toronto because of dishonest practices in connection with the recent examinations. Some of the students impersonated others, some were caught copying and indulging in other dishonest practices. They will not be allowed to return to the University and their names and records have been forwarded to other Canadian colleges.

RURAL PROBLEMS DISCUSSED

West Middlesex Women's Institute in Annual Convention at Appin

With 10 branches reporting out of 11, a total membership of 337 and a year's expenditure of \$216.78, the Women's Institutes of West Middlesex held their annual district meeting at the Appin Methodist church on Wednesday of last week.

Mrs. Douglas presided as president of the district and the secretarial report was presented by Mrs. Brunt of Kerwood, who noted especially the report of Institute No. 3 of Mosca, which has contributed large sums to the children's shelter in London, the Navy League, Institute for the Blind and various other worthy objects, in addition to a splendid record of programs. Officers elected at the morning session, which concluded with luncheon, were Mrs. John Macfie, president, and Mrs. Brunt, secretary-treasurer.

Peter McArthur, the Canadian writer, was the chief speaker at the afternoon session, giving a delightful talk on "Canadian Authors." Mr. McArthur spoke with enthusiasm of the recently-formed authors' association, with its enrolment of 300 in Winnipeg and 150 in Toronto alone, and touched on the outstanding work of such writers as Bliss Carman, Duncan C. Scott, Archibald Lampman, Chas. G. D. Roberts, etc.

A paper on "How to Keep the Boys on the Farm" was interestingly presented by Mrs. Higinburgh, who suggested the scheme of making each boy in childhood the possessor of his own share in the farm stock as an incentive to carry on at home. "Give him a hen and a pig and a calf for his own and don't take them away when grown to maturity," Mrs. Higinburgh said.

Mrs. George Edwards of Komoka spoke briefly on "The Federation of Societies" giving as a motto the advice to "do all the good you can in every place, to every person, in every way."

An attractive program included an address of welcome by Mrs. Lotan, replied to by Mrs. Richards of Middlesex; an address from Rev. R. G. Murphy of Wardsville; reading of Scott's poem, "Lundy's Lane," by Mrs. Brady of Napier; recitation by Miss Gilbert of Newbury, and a solo by Miss McGowan.

The 1922 convention will take place in Mosca.

WOULD REMOVE HORSESHOES

Removal of the horseshoes from the yard of the Middlesex jail is recommended in an official report from the Inspector of Prisons following a visit recently paid to the jail by the inspector and Provincial Secretary Nixon. It is pointed out in the letter that this jailyard is used for exercise by the Murdells and Williams, awaiting trial for the murder of Russell Campbell at Melbourne, and the horseshoes which are used in playing quoits might easily be removed by the prisoners and later employed as weapons. The inspector also recommended the permanent appointment of an additional turnkey. Turnkeys, he states, cannot be held responsible in case of trouble unless they are given adequate time for relaxation and recreation.
