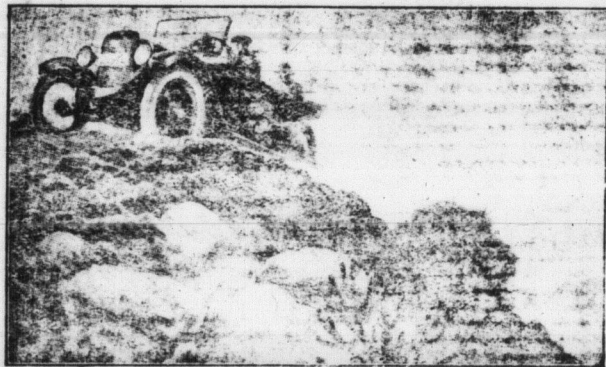

OVER SOUTHERN MOUNTAINS

'Tis a far cry from the sagebrush of Arizona and the mountain trails of California to the prairies of Western Canada and the town and country roads of all the other provinces between British Columbia and Prince Edward Island. Yet automobile tests of the severest kind ever attempted, over mountains and through streams and the roughest of American country, had much to do with a car that is now being made in Canada, by Canadians and for Canadians.

onto sold a single car.
