ing can be done here without a permit of the strike committee. Municipal government has abdicated entirely. This man said he had just seen two sets of wantonness, and both had occurred with military cars. A bullet had whizzed through the window of one car, bearing a staff officer. A heavy iron bolt had been thrown through another. Orders had been issued to take off all O.H.M.S. signs from army automobiles.

This officer said three battalions were being recruiting with soldiers and civilians, the 8th, the 43rd, and the 100th. These precautions were merely in case disturbances occurred. Personally, he hoped there would not be any trouble.

I asked him what was attitude of soldiers to strikers. He said he thought on the whole it was sympathetic and would remain so as long as the strikers remained orderly. The soldiers were, however, determined, to take hand in the suppression of any violence from any quarter whatsoever.

The decision of the mass meeting of veterans is reported by writers of labor news as follows: "That this meeting declares its full sympathy with purposes of present strike to meet general conditions of the people and pledges itself to use every legitimate means to preserve law and order, and that after the strike is settled, labor, with returned soldiers, get together and discuss the deportation of undesirable enemy aliens."

This is said to have been substituted for a longer resolution prepared by the executive and defeated at the meeting. It did state that by far the largest number of returning soldier-citizens were drawn from the ranks labor, with whose legitimate demands they were in complete sympathy. But it emphasized that it realized some of the insidious campaign inaugurated amongst certain sections of labor and of returned citizens, to spread propaganda of most virulent and disloyal type, with an avowed object of a causing unrest and instigating a revolution.

Especially in the absence of regular news channels, there were all sorts of rumors rife in Winnipeg, some of the most disquieting nature, but no confirmation of any of them was available. One of the wildest was that Mayor Gray was to be deported and a full-fledged soviet government instituted. As it is, however, the labor paper admits that any activities that are being carried on, including the poisoning of the streets, are being done, under strike permits. As for the maintenance of order labor leaders are certainly keen for it.

The most orderly strikes on record, so the headline, and the strike committee, so it says, recognized that to win the strike it was necessary to preserve a maximum of order, so as not to play into the hands of our opponents.

To judge from numerous expressions of opinion what the general public of Winnipeg resents is what it considers the dictatorial attitude of the strike committee. More than one person to whom I spoke sighed for an O.H.M.S. of Seattle but others seemed to fear all provocative measures. Even of speech, and of the strike committee, it is felt here by a lot of people, who, while not necessarily in sympathy with the strikers, and who feel keenly the inconvenience of the strike, the employers have chosen had ground on which to fight to these people, and they are many, who declare that it is incredible that a general strike should be called at this time of the year, the issue of the recognition of the union.

It reveals, they say, in the minds of employers a backward or at least stationary outlook that is difficult to understand. These say that anyone studying labor conditions and labor throughout the world, knows that compared with many doctrines and movements prevalent today, trade unionism is a conservative, constructive force. Trade unionism itself is fighting much more radical and extreme forces and, from this point of view, it seems strange that employers should not encourage unions and their recognition, rather than oppose them. In Great Britain the whole Whitley scheme of cooperation between employers and employed is based on labor organized in trade unions, and the plan operates only through the recognized medium of trades' unions on the one hand and employers' associations on the other. If an industry is not organized in this way the Whitley plan does not apply and some preliminary, preparatory method is adopted.

During the recent visit of the Industrial Relations Commission in the west, interesting views on unionism were brought out. A good many employers, although objecting to unions, did refuse to recognize them or to deal with their officials. In Victoria there was a case of an employer who admitted he had thrown in the towel, a letter from the business agent of a union, asking for a conference on wages and hours for his men, and making certain demands that appeared to be reasonable on both sides. By the employer because an outside business agent had tried to "interfere" with his affairs, and the union men because the union's communication had been ignored.

In Vancouver, in the midst of a critical, indeed dangerous situation, almost the only ray of light was the evidence of conditions in the Coughlan Shipbuilding yards. There had been disquieting labor troubles there, but the company finally agreed not only to recognize the union, but to make the establishment a "closed shop". Mr. Coughlan himself testified before the commission, and said that he had found it much more satisfactory to deal direct with the union and that the change had proved to be beneficial, as one result of the policy an Efficiency committee had been organized, consisting of three union men and three representatives of the company. It was yet too soon to estimate its full success but both Mr. Coughlan and one of the employers' representatives declared their belief in the plan and already perceived benefits and a better spirit of amity. Two out of the three men's representatives were socialists, but on the committee, they dealt with practical matters from the standpoint of trades unionists and did not insist on an immediate and uncompromising move towards actual socialism.

Several other employers, in various cities, decided their preference to deal with recognized representatives of trade unions, saying that they had secured more harmony and unanimity of decision than when dealing with representatives of unorganized or dissipated groups.

One of the arguments freely used by Winnipeg employers here, both a week ago and now when the strike is a reality is that the whole movement is engineered by the "O.G. Big Union," and this tie-up is a great throw of the dice, by new forces in an effort to establish their supremacy in a drastic, dramatic fashion. These employers say that one big union is a serious power, that must be crushed and that the fight may as well come now
