## MARRIAGE IN CHINA.

**Majority and Marriage of the Emperor**  
—Magnificent Ceremonies.  
Tientsin, March 20.—The Chinese government seems to be entirely absorbed just now in making the preliminary arrangements for the young emperor's marriage and his assumption of authority as the actual head of the state. The first of these arrangements is for him to worship at the tombs of his ancestors, and this requires a journey of about one hundred miles to the northeastward. A special road has been built for him to travel over. It is covered with yellow sand and furnished with imperial lodging houses at suitable intervals, and cannot be used by any one else till he is done with it. He will be accompanied on the journey by a large retinue, including the empress regent (his aunt), the seventh prince (his father), the viceroy Li Hung Chang (his tutor), and by many of the grand dignitaries of the empire. He will start at 3 or 4 o'clock in the morning from the imperial palace at Peking, will ride in a covered cart, and all the streets and roads through which his cortege passes will be carefully guarded from foreign eyes. It is understood that he will have to repeat the journey to the tombs of the dynasty after his marriage, which is set for next year, but after that it will not be required of him again.

Of course the journey and attending ceremonies will be regulated according to well-established custom, and will be very grand, including as they will the most important Chinese officials, besides servants and outlookers, who are permitted to take part in them, either as agents or witnesses. It is estimated that the expense of the affair, which will last about ten days, including the time spent in going and coming, will be somewhere between five hundred thousand dollars and a million.

It is also said that the empress regent has selected one of her nieces, the daughter of the Duke Chow, as the first wife of the young emperor, and that the young lady, who is just 16, is pretty, amiable, and highly accomplished. She is a great favorite of her aunt, and while she has so far lived in no greater state than the other daughters of the imperial clan or family, she will be hedged about with endless ceremony after her marriage, if not with great comfort and magnificence. Her immediate family is neither rich nor old, nor has it been distinguished, so far as I can learn, for any special qualities on the part of its male members. It is principally not-d as having furnished two wives to the late emperor, Hien-fung, both of whom were noted for their ability and strength of character, as well as for their beauty. One of them survives as empress regent, the aunt of the young emperor Kwang hin, and of the young lady who is to be his wife. She is now the absolute ruler of the country, and although she will be required to retire when the emperor assumes personal control of the government, as both she and her sister did upon the assumption of the late unfortunate T'ung-chi, she will doubtless remain for the rest of her life the most considerable and influential subject in the empire.

**Not Discouraged by Fighting with West.**  
CINCINNATI, April 26.—A special despatch from Winnipeg, Man., says: "The great northern Cree chief Big Bear and three of his head men, all of whom have been in the penitentiary at Stony Mountain, this province, for nearly a year for their acts in connection with the Bel rebellion, have been set at liberty, and ordered back to their reservation. An attempt was made to interview Big Bear, but he refused to talk. All who have seen him consider that his health is irrevocably broken. Crowfoot, another Cree chief who was released some time ago, have both sent messengers to Big Bear assuring him that his official dignity had not been in the slightest degree diminished by his unfortunate imprisonment. His people, who dwell on the upper Saskatchewan, are preparing to give the old man a rousing reception on his return, although the government has forbidden any open acts of the kind."

**Demands for the President's Hair.**  
If President Cleveland complied with all requests for a lock of his hair his head would be as bare as a billiard ball in less than a week. One lady from Indianapolis has written that she is poor, and asks the president to instruct his barber to forward her all the hair cut from the executive's head. She proposes to make this hair into Cleveland curls and sell them to gentlemen to wear on their watch chains. Another person in Richmond, Va., wants the same hair to stuff a cushion made of silk, taken from an old United States flag. This cushion she will raffle at a church fair for the benefit of a needy Methodist congregation.

## ARBITRATION OF LABOR DISPUTES.

**A Bill Introduced to Accordance with the President's Suggestions.**  
WASHINGTON, April 26.—Mr. Springer of Illinois, introduced in the house today, a bill to establish a department of labor and to create a board for the arbitration of controversies between labor and capital.

The general duties of the department are to acquire and diffuse among the people useful information on subjects connected with labor in the most general and comprehensive sense of that word, and especially upon its relation to capital, the hours of labor, the earnings of laboring men and women, and the means of promoting their material, social, intellectual, and moral prosperity. In the department there shall be established a commission of labor, consisting of three members, who shall be charged with the consideration and settlement, by means of arbitration, when possible, of all controversies between labor and capital. The commissioner in charge of the department shall receive a salary of \$4,000, and he and two assistant commissioners, to be appointed by the president, shall constitute the commission of labor, which shall have power to investigate the causes of all controversies and disputes between labor and capital, whether such controversies and disputes are submitted for arbitration or not, and to report thereon to the president, who shall transmit the reports to Congress.

In all controversies or disturbances which may interfere with transit and commerce between the states, it shall be the duty of the commission of labor to act as a board of arbitration for the peaceful settlement of such controversies whenever the conciliatory efforts of said commission may be invoked by the parties thereto. And in all controversies between laboring men and their employers the consequences of which are confined within the limits of any state and which may threaten domestic violence, the interposition of such commission may be invoked by the president for the purpose of settling such controversies by arbitration, on application by the legislature of such state or of the executive when the legislature cannot be convened.

All questions submitted for arbitration shall be in writing and signed by the parties respectively, and the decision or award shall have such effect only as provided in the articles of submission. All awards shall be entered of record and a copy furnished to each of the parties, and one copy shall be transmitted to any court which may be authorized to take any action thereon. The proceedings of the commission shall be public, except when the commissioners are in consultation. The machinery is provided to enable the commissioners to perform their duties.

**107 Years Old.**  
The oldest man in New England is said to be Chesley Heal of Seabrook, Me., who is 107 years old. It is recorded that he has been married three times, twice to the same woman; that he has chewed tobacco for 100 years and drank New England rum for nearly as long a time; that he voted for Jefferson the first time he was a presidential candidate, and has been a democrat from that day to this, and that he can and does read the newspapers without spectacles.
