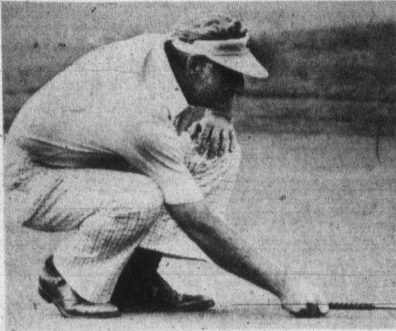


Weslock top golfer again



TORONTO — For the eighth time since his first full measure of success, Mississauga's ageless wonder Nick Weslock tops the official rankings of the Ontario Golf Association.

Weslock, the only golfer to be among the pace-setters of both regular and seniors' amateur tournaments, won the top spot over Sunningdale's youthful Kelly Roberts, the Indiana State University golfer, who scored victories over the veteran Mississauga player in both the Ontario Amateur and Ontario Open.

A member of the Willingdon Cup, Weslock won the 1972 provincial seniors title; came third behind Roberts and Kitchener's Gary Cowan in the Ontario Amateur.

Joe Scanlon stepped down as coach of the Provincial Junior A Hockey League Dixie Bees ... Lorne Park resident Graham Leggat became general manager of the \$1 million O'Keefe Sports Foundation ... Blonde, pig-tailed Marie Watts tumbled her way to the overall tyro (under-14) provincial gymnastic championship title, preventing a clean sweep by Scarborough ...

Mississauga Sabres made their Halton Senior Baseball League debut a dull one, blanked by Cambridgeville 4-0 ... Left-winger Dave MacInnes scored the first goal of the new season in the Toronto and District Soccer League ... North America's largest amateur circuit, when he connected for a first-half tally to give Cooksville a 1-0 triumph over Velebit-Oakville ...

Cawthra Sandy's won the consolation championship of the annual Mississauga paperweight hockey tournament ... Dwight (Erindale Express) Edwards turned in a sizzling 10-7 second effort to win the classic 100-m dash at the Peel-Halton Secondary School track and field finals ...

Fifty-five Mississauga area sportsmen and women, representing a dozen wide-ranging areas of amateur competition, were wine and dined at the Ontario Sports Achievement Awards Banquet at Queens Park ...

Julie David, an 11-year-old Darcel Senior Public School student, established a new Ontario atom girls long jump record at a meet hosted by Mississauga Olympians ...

JUNE

Mississauga Crusaders nearly pulled off a big upset when they came to within a single try of beating visiting Welsh team Llandaff ... Nine-year-old Queenston Drive Public School student Kathy Hancher wrote a new page in the Ontario track and field record book when she leaped 12 feet 5 inches at the Loyol Order of Moose provincial age division provincial championships. Fellow Olympian athlete Andy Hay turned a triple crown performance to become the most successful tyke boy ...

Defying formidable odds, host Mississauga survived a generally miserable, rain-delayed beginning to turn the season-opening event of the 1973 paddling season into a champagne event ... Credit Valley golfer Gayle Borwick won her fourth consecutive Toronto and District Ladies Championship ...

An unprecedented feat ... A splendiferous streak of 45 games, which spanned nearly a year and a half of competitive minor soccer and earned them a wide range of honours from a Mississauga league title to the lofty heights of a Canadian age-division championship, came to an end for Port Credit. Unfortunately for coach Aldo Lista and his super-sharp prodigies, the blow came in the first round of an Ontario Cup against St. Andrew Mac Youngs of Scarborough, knocking Port Credit out of further contention ...

Mississauga athlete Kevin Hobbs set what is believed to be the best height ever achieved by any nine-year-old anywhere in the world, when he soared 4 feet 5 inches in breaking his own North American high jump record ... Three-time Canadian motorboat champion Spencer Dunn was the victim of a controversial decision that forced him to second place in glamour meet off Woodbine Beach ...

Mac Ward made his swan song a victorious one when he won the Mississauga men's tennis championship. Magnificent Max has now left the Credit River jungle of misadventure for the more pleasant climate of Australia ... Mildred Lauw walked away with the ladies singles tennis prize ...

JULY

Ignoring pre-race predictions of doom and a break in their long, time-honoured winning streak, Mississauga Canoe Club paddlers came up with a super effort to rule the waves once again and extended their traditional domination of the annual Dominion Day Regatta to nine consecutive years ...

Debbie Van Kiebel, the only Mississauga competing in the second annual Pacific Conference Games, finished a disappointing sixth in the long jump ... Anne Bryan (track and field), Julie Bonner, Bruce Rogers (swimming) and brother-sister combination Dean and Cara Pickell (water skiing) won Ontario Games championship medals ...

Craig Hill of Mississauga and Scarborough's Ludwig Helmuth, a pair of experienced auto racing veterans, combined forces to complete 207 laps at an average speed of 84.84 mph to capture the Goodrich Sundown six-hour race at Mosport ...

Top-ranking Canadian player Keith Carpenter's aspirations to become king of Ontario tennis simply melted away under the blazing sun as a super-cool Harry Fauquier beat the heat and his opponent to win the provincial men's title at Credit Valley. The ladies crown went to Barbara Brankowska for the second straight year ...

Marlene Scoble turned in her best-ever effort in placing a close second in the juvenile girls' high jump of the Eastern Canadian championship in Edmonton, N.B. ... Don Rowing Club competitors captured two of 25 titles at the Ontario championships with the junior 145-pound four (Jeff Holloway, Jeff Beatson, Marc deVanderschueren and Cam Brady) and the senior lightweight four (John Skelton, Steve Mages, Jeff Patrinquin and Fred Lock) taking turns in the winners' circle ...

Mississauga paddler John Wood established himself among the best when he finished fifth in the world championship's 500-m canoe finals on Kaukjarvi Lake, near Tampere, Finland ... Ben Kern pushed past the magic \$10,000 mark in earnings on the golden tour circuit when he picked up \$594 in prize money at the Canadian Open Golf Championships at Richelieu Valley, Montreal ...

Leo Trevino the clown prince of pro golf, and Arnold Palmer dropped in at Mississauga to help publicize the 1974 Canadian Open ...

AUGUST

Ann Bryan had a golden day, winning Canada Games championships in both long jump and 400-relay in Burnaby, B.C. Paddlers Bill Slayter, Brent Hayes and Greg Smith and oarsman Tim Webber were the other Mississaugans to walk away with individual laurels. Port Credit lawn bowler Don Carphin was a member of the victorious Ontario team, while the gold medalist girls field hockey contingent also contained several local athletes ...

Debbie Van Kiebel hit record form, setting a Canadian junior shot put mark with a toss of 47 feet, 5 inches at the Ontario track and field championships in Ottawa ...

Mississauga paddlers survived poor on-water officiating to win four Canadian national championships. John Wood took the senior C-1, then teamed with his "old international partner" Scott Lee to add the senior C-2. Greg Smith (juvenile C-1) and juvenile K-4 (Don Slayter, Kevin McMillan, Ian Ramsay and Rick Eggleton) took care of the rest ...

Bridgewood Public School runner Sylvester Brown stole the thunder at the second annual Robert Speck Memorial Track and Field Meet, winning three gold medals and setting new provincial mile marks in each category. What's more, he did it without wearing spikes. "They stuck in the ground," said Sylvester. Kevin Adams was named top tyke athlete ...

Clarkson sailor Sid Dakin won the North American sailing championship on Lake Ontario ... Cawthra Ginn bantam pitcher Steve Barron struck out 21 opponents and walked five to come oh-so-close to a perfect game ...

Erindale student Cara Pickell won her second straight Canadian junior girls water ski jumping championship title in Calgary ... Making his senior debut, Greg Smith teamed with veteran Olympian John Wood to win a North American senior tandem canoe title. Wood, in providing proof that he's among the best in the world, added short and long distance solo gold medals to his total for a glittering triple crown ...

"Mer-man" Bryon MacDonald splashed his way to a silver medal in the World Student Games butterfly swimming finals in Moscow ...

Ann Bryan helped Ontario set a Canadian 4x100-m junior relay record ... Nick Weslock won his fifth straight Ontario senior golf title ...

Softball's deluxe entertainer "King" Eddie Feigner brought his court to Port Credit and delighted a huge crowd of more than 800 with his famous antics ...

Host teams dominated the second annual Mississauga Intermediate Girls Lacrosse Tournament, winning six of the eight pieces of silverware ...

Making the most of their opportunity to shine before an appreciative home crowd, Clarkson Canadian Tire Lykes, Erindale LePage and Clarkson Lunds peewees took turns in gaining gems of Ontario provincial minor lacrosse championship titles until a unique Mississauga boxa triple crown was complete. It was the third straight year that the all-Ontario finals were held at Huron Park Arena ...

Coach Al Romolock's Sescolites went all the way to the Ontario bantam A girls softball title in their first year of competition. Forest Glen brought the juvenile E provincial title to Mississauga ...

A broken coil cost Villa rider Frank Wood the number one plate on the Canadian dirt track motorcycle scene ...

Former Toronto Marlies star Dick Decloe accepted an offer to play hockey in Holland this season ...

Mississauga Track and Field Club and Olympians merged to form what has immediately become one of Ontario's major clubs ...

Erindale Monarch juveniles became the first club in Kerry Blue history to win an Ontario juvenile lacrosse title. The victory completed a unique hat trick (they earlier took the Central League crown and emerged victorious from the Rexdale juvenile extravaganza) of success ...

Veteran south-paw Karl Mueller defeated Frank Pastor to win the Credit Valley single men's tennis title ...

Runner Ray Costello, already established as one of Canada's most outstanding long distance prospects, became the first-ever Woodlands student to win an all-Ontario high school championship. The 15-year-old athlete achieved the honour by coming first in the OFSAA midget boys cross-country finals in North Bay ...

Skaters Linda Tasker and Allan Carson turn pro after a splendid amateur career ... The year of the Gryphons? Who could argue in wake of a pair of unique achievements by Glenforest high school athletes. First it was the senior boys' volleyball team which shocked the odd observer or three by capturing the all-Ontario title. A week later, Gryphons dethroned Erindale Raiders for the Peel senior football crown ...

Mississauga Raiders became Metro Toronto Football Union intermediate champions in their sophomore season of competition, finally managing to catch Northwestern Ghosts ...

Bill Munden guided Robots to the Mississauga Football League bahtam crown to become the only coach to win a championship in three consecutive seasons. The MFL peewee title went to Mackay Hughes Lakers, who upset Premier Concrete in the final at CNE Stadium ...

Former Swedish national hockey coach Arne Stromberg visited Huron Park Arena to hold a clinic — an event almost completely ignored by Mississauga minor hockey mentors ...

NOVEMBER

Former Canadian atom champions Port Credit, competing an age division above their heads, edged Dixie Johns-Manville for the Mississauga Association Mosquito Soccer Cup final ...

Paddlers John Wood and Greg Smith, on a look-see mission in preparation for the 1974 world championships, finished runners-up in the Mexico kayak-canoe championships. Both Mississaugans found themselves facing an oxygen crisis in the "thin air" of Mexico City ...

Mississauga runner Debbie Schulte won the Ontario bantam girls cross-country title. The 13-year-old girl followed her feat with a history-making effort when she beat a field of much older athletes in the scenic splendour of Ottawa Valley to become the midget of the Eastern Canadian meet ...

Another Mississauga athlete to take a shower in athletic recognition was Gail Killin, a 19-year-old petite brunette, who became the only Canadian female runner to complete the gruelling marathon (26 miles) twice under competitive conditions. The Applewood high school graduate came second in the Motor City Marathon classic in Detroit ...

Larry Comeau, coach of the Mississauga PCO's junior A team for the past two seasons, departed from the local lacrosse scene. "Mutual agreement" was the official word on the parting of company ...

Applewood high school student Kathy Ostapchuk defended her Central Ontario junior ladies free skating championship crown ...

Sandy Hawley Mississauga's super hockey, snapp'd Willie Schoemaker's 20-year-old world record and became the first man in racing history to ride more than 500 winners in a single year. And just to illustrate how ignorant Canada's sports media is, Hawley was beaten by Phil Esposito to Canada's male athlete of the year title in a poll of sports writers. The public picked Hawley as the nation's sportsman in the Toronto Star's version of the year-end polling ...

Sam Riddell stepped down as head of Mississauga's minor soccer after a 17-year leadership ...

Defending champion Tom Weiskopf, chosen as "Golfer of the Year", was the first entry into next year's glamour Canadian Open at Mississauga ...

Swimmers Bruce Rogers and Julie Bonner set Ontario age division records at the Hall of Fame meet at York University ... Joe Gurovka skipped his Dixie foursome to a surprise victory in the Consols Challenge Spiel and became the first curler to qualify for the Ontario championship rounds ...

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AIRPORT INQUIRY COMMISSION COMMISSION D'ENQUÊTE SUR L'AÉROPORT

TAKE NOTICE that by Order in Council P.C. 1973-3026 dated 5th October, 1973, the Government of Canada established the Airport Inquiry Commission to inquire into and report upon the air transportation needs of the central Ontario market. The Commission has opened its office at Suite 5401, 54th Floor of the Toronto Dominion Bank Tower, Toronto-Dominion Centre, in the City of Toronto. The manner in which the Commission will conduct this Inquiry may be briefly stated as follows:

- The Government of Canada will file a summary of all relevant factors, with supporting documents, which the Government considered in reaching its decisions that the transportation needs of the central Ontario market require that there be established another International Airport in addition to the existing Toronto International Airport, Malton, and that the location of the new International Airport be at a site near Pickering, Ontario.
- The Government of Canada documents so filed will be available for inspection by any member of the public at the office of the Commission.
- All persons, including witnesses for the Government of Canada, who wish to appear before the Commission at any Public Hearing will be required to file at the Commission's office a full written statement of the evidence which they propose to adduce before the Commission.

Personnel will be available at the Commission's office to guide members of the public who wish assistance with the preparation of the written statement of their proposed evidence.

- All written statements of evidence will be available for inspection at the Commission's office by any member of the public in advance of any Public Hearing at which such evidence will be introduced before the Commission.
- The Commission has established a Practice and Procedure for the orderly conduct of the Inquiry. Copies are available at the Commission's office free of charge or will be mailed to any interested person upon request. This Practice and Procedure has been framed with a view that all persons will have the opportunity before any Public Hearing to know the nature of the evidence that will be submitted to the Commission at each Public Hearing.
- There will be a public Organizational Meeting before the Public Hearings commence relating to the manner of conducting such Public Hearings. Notice of the time and place of the Organizational Meeting will be given by notice published in newspapers serving the central Ontario market.
- Public Hearings will take place from time to time and the date and place of each Hearing will be given to the public in advance by notices published in newspapers serving the central Ontario market.
