My impression was that it was not a very good way to carry out an investigation which I had wan ed done in secret. I don't know if it was intended to be done in such a way so as to cover up the people involved. My category is U-3 on account of breaking my shoulder on a parachute jump.

PLEA IN MITIGATION OF SERVENCE
