being duly sworn is examined by the prosecutor.

I recognise the accused. On 14 Dec '42 I collected
the washing from Mr. Squ. about between 7:30
and 8 o'clock. The accused gave me his washing
I took it home to the wife. The accused gave me
this kit bag (Exhibit 6) which I recognise. The wife
turned the kit bag out. She picked the washing up
and carried each piece separately and made a list
of what was in the bag. As she was picking it up
a Wilson laundry list fell out. ~~This list~~
My wife dumped out the laundry. It was not in
separate bundles. It was all together. I was
having my breakfast at the time. I looked at the
Wilson's laundry slip. I noticed Sgt. Conscience
name on the slip but I did not pay much attention
to the articles listed on it.

Cross examined:

The accused brought the laundry down to me
in the kitchen personally. If someone gave me a
large bundle of laundry I would fold it up and
put it in a kit bag if there was room in one to fit.
I usually get three kit bags at a time. My wife
does about 3 meals laundry. I do not wash up
the meals laundry. It is done up for me. Sometimes
it is tied up in brown paper. Sometimes it is just
tied up with string. My wife turns out the
laundry. I do not. I have never heard my wife
remark about a piece of ~~clothes~~ laundry
in another man's laundry. My wife leaves the
laundry accumulating on the floor until she
begins washing. When I pick up the laundry
there are usually only the three kitchen staff
present. I put the meals laundry in the kit bags.
I take particular notice that they are tied up
either with string or by the shirt sleeves.

Re-examined:

We only do eight laundries and I am familiar
with them. I do not recall any laundry ever
getting mixed up.

By the defense Advocate:

Sgt. Conscience has never given me any laundry. He
