IN RAIN'S PITILESS FALL

Thousands Attend Funeral of the Hon. James Sutherland.

Dominion Premier and Cabinet and About Fifty Members of Parliament, With Officials of Public Works Department, Were in Attendance -Sir Wilfrid Laurier's Grief Poignant -Sobbed Throughout the Services.

Woodstock, May 8—Not in the history of Woodstock has there been such an outpouring of grief as was witnessed during the burial of Hon. James Sutherland, Minister of Public Works, in the Dominion Cabinet, on Saturday afternoon. Though the rain was incessant throughout the day, thousands of citizens stood on the street for two hours waiting for the solemn procession from "Altadore" to pass, and many went out to the Presbyterian demetery to witness the last sad rites.

Premier and Cabinet.

A special train bearing Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his Cabinet and about 50 members of Parliament, as well as of ficials of the Public Works Department, came in by C. P. R. in the morning Representatives of the political, business and social world from many points arrived by the regular trains, and hundreds drove in from the country roundabout. Business was suspended in the city from 2 to 4, and nearly every store on Dundas street displayed a pleture of the late representative, appropriately draped, while flags drooping at haif mast and the solemn tolling of church bells indicated the sorrow, of Woodstock.

Sir Wilfrid Sobbed Throughout.

Sir Wilfrid Sobbed Throughout, at the magnificent Sutherland hom At the magnificent Sutherland home in the outskirts a sad scene was enacted at 2.39 when Rev. Dr. McMullen of Knox Church began the service for the dead. Around the casket were placed the floral tributes of a sorrowing people. In the room were Mr. Sutherland's closest friends, but the grief of none was more poignant than that of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. His affection for "Jim" Sutherland was the affection of a brother, and those who know the Premier say he has lost a colleague who was closer to him than any other. Sir Wilfrid's grief was uncontrollable, and he sobbed throughout the ceremony.
