## Eighty-Seven Cows on Test at Guelph

New High Records Established for Two Breeds. A Great Showing in Spite of Poor Accommodation

THE Dairy Test at the Ontario Provincial Winter Fair last Provincial Winter Fair last week established several new high records. The sweepstakes cow scored higher than any winner of previous years. The highest Ayr-shire cow established a new record Shife cow estantisted a new record for her breed. The average produc-tion in several classes was higher than ever before. The number of en-tries was unprecedented. And the unsatisfactory conditions under which almost half the cows had to work were never before equalled, even at Guelph.
