These federations are formed primarily of field men affiliated with insurance organizations of all sorts and policyholders are also eligible for membership. Their primary object is the protection of insurance interests both those of the policyholders, the companies and the agents.

The organizers have distinct ideas regarding the equality of discriminatory taxation of insurance premiums and it is their purpose to see that the policyholder understands that he is taxed because he insures and that his less thrifty neighbor escapes taxation because he does not jushre
