Belgians, Themselves Destitute, Share up with French Comrades in Distress— Help Urgently Needed

London, Jan. 10.-Herbert Hoover, chairman of the American commission the work being done for the Commission in Belgium. In a statement issued to the Press Mr. Hoover said:

"An appalling situation has been presented to the commission with regard to the French peasantry in the valley of the Meuse, just south of the Belgian frontier, where there are ten The Cologne Gazette remarks that, thousand persons absolutely without food. Our investigation showed that a large number of deathes already had occurred there from starvation.

Share With Others Needy.

"Despite the shortness of the raions in Belgium our Belgian colleagues agreed that we must share the last crust with these people."

Mr. Hoover also issued a report on he Commission's work in Belgium, in which he says the organisation for the distribution of food supplies is well on the road to completion.

"It must be borne in mind," Mr. Hoover said in his report, "that the problem falls into two phases. The irst is the provision of bread for those who are able to pay for it, and the second, the provision of all foods for those who are destitute. Broadly speaking the former comprise some 5,500,000 persons. On the basis of the minimum ration we are providing they require about \$3,500,000 worth

1,400,000 Wholly Destitute.

"The destitute comprise 1,400,000, who are being wholly fed through the public canteens. The cost of supporting them is about \$2,500,000 per nonth, for which we are depending on he charity of the world.

"All Belgium is now on a ration of en ounces of bread per day, rich and ost price, the destitute nothing.
