

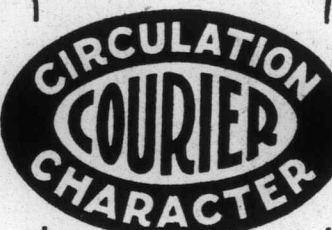

## BRANTFORD NOT TO BE OVERLOOKED

### Mayor Bowly Insists Upon Original Route for Provincial Highway

Mayor Bowly has sent the following communication to the Mayor of Woodstock:

Dear Sir: I observe in this morning's Globe that the city of Kitchener has invited a conference at that place for 29th March, 1917, for the purpose of deciding on the best possible route for the proposed new Provincial Highway from Toronto West to Windsor and suggests West through Brampton, Guelph, Kitchener, Stratford, St. Mary's to London.

I also observe that in the Legislature the Government has stated that the route had not been settled. I need scarcely inform you that our immediate attention should be directed to safeguard our interests in reference to this subject matter as it means to Brantford and to your town, an almost incalculable loss. Our Council meets on Monday, 26th March 1917, and the subject matter will be dealt with by it, as the gravity of the situation demands. I trust that you will consult your Council and help us by every possible means in your power to avert this misfortune of the diversion of this route from its natural channel. I have addressed to the Mayor of Ingersoll a like communication. I have also written Mayor Bowker of Hamilton. I think by judicious action that we will not be sidetracked and the road zigzagged out of its natural channel. Please advise me at your earliest convenience what, if any, action has been taken by you and your council.

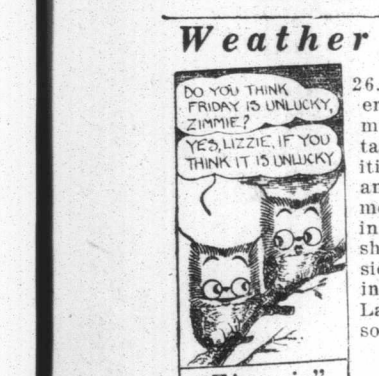
## America's Entry Into War is No Matter of Consequence to Hun Leaders

By Courier Leased Wire.  
London, March 26.—The possibility of American participation in war on the side of the Allies was missed as a minor matter by General von Stein, Prussian minister of war in an interview with the Berlin correspondent of the Budapest newspaper, A Zest, according to a dispatch, to Reuter's by way of sterdum. General von Stein said he did not know whether the British fleet would support the German fleet, but that there could be question of an American contingent in the near future. He added: "Our military situation on fronts is good and justifies our hopes. It appears that the enemy preparing an offensive, but we resist even a stronger attack, not only at the front, but also at the rear. What may happen then we do not know, but come what may, we confront everything imperturbably. Our sufferings are great and our sacrifices gigantic, but it is just in things of that the greatness of a finds its expression."
