Curios Brought Misfortunes

That certain things bring sure disaster to their owners is firmly believed in by many people. Take the case of a Mr. Appery, a young artist. A little over three years ago he bought a small West African idol or ju-ju. Before this, says Pearson's Weekly, for years in succession he had had his pictures hung in the Royal Academy. He has not had a picture in the Academy since he bought the idol. Just after Mr. Appery bought his house was burglarized and all his wife's jewelry stolen. A week or two later an outbreak of fire occurred. Next year artist had a run of bad luck and disappointment.

He loaned the "ju-ju" to a friend, who returned it hurriedly in a fortnight. During that time he lost heavily over a business deal; his wife, a most careful woman, scalded herself on two occasions; his neighbors bought a puppy the day after the idol came, and the result was a mob stoned his windows by mistake for those of the puppy owner. Finally he had a severe attack of rheumatism. No wonder he returned the idol.

Still more extraordinary was the case of the mummy of the high priestess of Amen-Ra, now in the British Museum. This priestess belonged to the royal family of Egypt. A party of four young Englishmen secured the mummy about thirty years ago in Egypt. One of the young men was crippled before they left that country, and another was shot shortly before reaching England. A third died suddenly, and the fourth followed him after being a large fee had been paid.

The sister of the last finally presented the mummy to the museum. The man who drove it there died within a week, while one who helped to carry it into the building soon afterward had both his legs cut off in a railway accident. The first man who attempted to photograph the mummy case fell, smashed his camera and cut his face severely. The first journalist who described the mummy that followed it died soon afterward.

Finally the daughter of the Marchioness of Salisbury, who went to look at the mummy fell and sprained her ankle. Another ill luck bringer that was thrown out of the house and given to the museum was a carved tea-wood image of Buddha.

It was stolen from a Buddhist temple in Lower Burma by a sea captain. When the ship carrying it was near Liverpool a fire broke out on board. The crew threw the image overboard, believing the idol was responsible, and they reached port in safety. The image was washed ashore in Wales and claimed by its owner, the captain. Soon afterward he died. His daughters kept the Buddha in their house for several years, during which time it gave rise to continual troubles. One of them then it was given to the museum.

An Indian idol is said to have been responsible for the assassination of President Carnot of France. It belonged to one of the rulers of India, and there was a tradition that the idol bestowed power with one hand and death with the other.

Ruler after ruler who possessed the idol was assassinated. When Great Britain conquered India the idol then in the possession of a rajah, lost his life fighting against the British, but his lumber hands. It continued to bring evil fortune in its train, however. Among its possessors who died suddenly, before it reached President Carnot, were a major of British cavalry, a Brahmin prince, a rich money lender and an old dealer in antiquities.

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FOREST RESERVE

Recommended in Prince Albert District, Sask.

The forestry branch of the Department of the Interior has again, during the past summer, had parties out examining the timber on some of the regions still in the hands of the Dominion Government, with a view to reserving from settlement lands more suitable for forest growth than for farming. Some of these parties have finished the work assigned them and have made their reports.

Mr. C. H. Morse made an examination of a district northwest from Prince Albert, 144 deg between the Shellbrook branch of the Canadian Northern Railway (on the west), and the third Dominion meridian (longitude 106 degrees) and recommends that the tract between the meridian on the east and the Sturgeon River on the west should be made a forest reserve. This land is not pure sand, but has some stretches of sand among lands of better quality; none of it, however, can be classed as good agricultural land. At the present time this tract carries, in places, a good stand of spruce, as good a stand as will be found anywhere in the country. The reproduction of the forest is good and this should make one of the most valuable forest tracts in the west. The rate of growth is good. As it is calculated that the present stand of timber, which is held under license, will be cut out in ten years, it will be seen that the necessity for looking for a future supply is close at hand.

The tract lying between the railway and Sturgeon River was found to be of good agricultural quality, and, as the timber is pretty well cut out, it was not considered necessary to recommend any further reservation beyond the time required for the removal of the present stand.—Department of the Interior, Forestry Branch.

THE "COLD PACK." (BY A PHYSICIAN.)

A cold pack is a fine home substitute for a Turkish bath, when such treatment is indicated. It is an ideal way to get up a good healthy reaction when the circulation is sluggish. Wrap the patient, naked, in a sheet wrung out of cold water, then wrap patient and sheet in several blankets, or in a blanket and a quilt. Swathe him like a mummy. Presently, he will be as warm as toast. After an hour or two the pack should be removed, taking care that the patient be not chilled. A good rub down and then a long sleep will finish the job.
