PRINCIPLE LAID DOWN.

Natural Flow of Streams Must Not Be Obstructed.

Montreal, Dec. 3.—A joint report filed by the International Waterways Commission re. proposed canalization of the Richelieu River, thereby connecting the River St. Lawrence with Lake Champlain, N.Y., although mainly of local interest to Montreal, lays down the principle of general interest that "it is, in our opinion, not desirable that either nation should obstruct the natural flow of streams crossing the international boundary to the injury of public or private rights in the other."

Face Loss of \$1,500,000.

Toronto, Dec. 3.—Alleging that certain rumors which reflected on the title of the Nipissing Mine were responsible for distrust on their part, the Guggenheims of New York City on Saturday declined to meet the second payment of \$2,500,000 on the option they held on 400,000 shares. In doing this, it was announced, they stood prepared to face losses to participants amounting to over \$1,500,000. This action and excuse on the part of the New York mine capitalists seems, however, to be taken with a grain of salt.

Settlement Pending.

Montreal, Dec. 3.—Although no definite announcement was made yesterday re the steel and coal difficulty, it may be said that arrangements are now in progress that will in a day or two and probably in a few hours lead to a settlement satisfactory and profitable to both parties.

LASSOES JEWISH RABBI.

Jewish Pastor Thrown From Buggy and Killed.

Regina, Sask., Dec. 3.—Wm. Barnes of Beckham is in jail here charged with the death of a Jewish rabbi by lassoing him from his buggy. The rabbi was driving along in a buggy, when a dog belonging to Mr. Barnes, who was riding on horseback, ran after him. The rabbi lashed it with his whip. Despite Barnes' remonstrances he continued to whip the dog, when Barnes lassoed the rabbi, hauling him out of the buggy and breaking his neck, so that he died shortly after. Barnes was arrested and lodged in jail here.

CONSPIRACY CHARGED.

Employers' Association and Others Said to Keep Men From Work.

Toronto, Dec. 3.—A charge of conspiracy to prevent Israel Mintz from carrying on his trade as a garment worker has been laid against the Employers' Association of Canada, James G. Merrick (secretary), The Lowndes Clothing Co., Henry Lowndes, Charles B. Lowndes, J. M. Lowndes, and the T. Eaton Co., and the officers of that company have been summoned to appear before Magistrate Denison today.

This is the first of the "black list" charges ever brought in Canada.

Farmer's Wife Suicides.
Watford, Dec. 3.—Mrs. Robert Campbell, wife of one of Watford's best known and wealthiest farmers, took her own life early Saturday morning by cutting her throat with a knife. Mrs. Campbell, who was in her 53rd year, has been suffering with melancholia, having recently lost a daughter.

Farmer's Strange Suicide.
Regina, Sask., Dec. 3.—George Sheppard, a farmer, living 16 miles south of Regina, committed suicide Saturday by placing a shotgun in his mouth and sending the charge into his brain. No cause can be assigned for the deed.

COURT-MARTIAL LIEUTENANT.

Who Ordered British Seamen to Go Down on Their Knees.

Portsmouth, Eng., Dec. 3.—An Admiralty order was received Saturday directing the trial by court-martial of Lieut. Bernard St. George Collard, to whose order, "on your knees," the recent mutinous outbreak is attributed.

It transpired at the trials of the mutinous sailors that Lieut. Collard, on one occasion, in 1905, lost his temper and gave the more offensive order to a stoker of "On your knees, you dog!" The lieutenant subsequently was obliged to apologize.

Needle Stabs Lover to Death.
Scranton, Pa., Dec. 3.—The coroner's jury which investigated the death of Thomas Dougherty, of Dunmore, who died two weeks ago as the result of a stab wound in the heart, alleged to have been inflicted by Miss Kate Burke, his sweetheart, returned a verdict Saturday, exonerating the girl. Miss Burke claimed that a needle in her waist pierced Dougherty's heart while he was embracing her.

Mayor Vailles Asks Damages.
Ottawa, Dec. 3.—A \$20,000 suit for damages has been entered in the Hull Superior Court against Yvon Lamontagne, legal adviser and treasurer of the Buckingham labor union, by Mayor J. E. Vailles, of that town, on the charge of having furnished false information, causing the Mayor's arrest in connection with the riot.

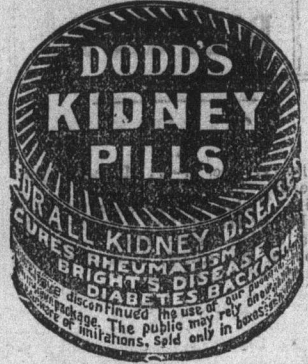
Fiend Brands Wife.

Big Deal Announced.

Toronto, Dec. 3.—One of the biggest industrial enterprises in Canada has just been created. The news came out on the stock exchange Saturday that the Canadian Rubber Co., the Granby Rubber Co., and the Maple Leaf Rubber Co. had been taken over by the Canadian Consolidated Rubber Co., Limited, with a capitalization of \$5,000,000 stock and \$2,600,000 ten year 6 per cent. gold bonds.

NOT SUITED TO CANADA.

Mazoomdar Opposed to Hindu Emigration From India.

"I have written to every prominent newspaper in the Punjab, advising the editors to use every effort to stop the emigration of Hindus to British Columbia. My report to the community of British Columbia that sent me here to investigate will be of exactly the same nature."

This was the remark made by Mr. T. C. Mazoomdar of the University of Allahabad, who has been investigating the conditions as affecting emigration from Hindustan to this province for some considerable time. Writes the special correspondent of The Globe at Victoria, B. C. Mr. Mazoomdar is an educated Bengali, who came here to look into the prospects and circumstances of the Hindus who had hoped by selling their farms to come to this province. Despite glowing reports from Hong Kong that induced the invasion, this competent investigator has decided against British Columbia and Canada generally as an outlet for the surplus population of India.

"Oh, not only the cold weather you have in the mountains caused me to come to my conclusion," he said, "there are many other things. Everything here is so different. Punjab does not know your manners and customs, and besides religious and other considerations are strongly against them. There is no organized effort to send Hindus here, and the rumor of 1,000 coming in one steamer is, I am sure, erroneous."

"How many have come to this continent already?"

"The exact figures are 1,482," was the reply, "but not all these are in British Columbia. There are a few in Seattle, about 40 around San Francisco, and a dozen or so in Oakland. Of the balance, roughly speaking, 1,400 at the most are in Vancouver and vicinity, although a few are on the island and Victoria. Of those in Vancouver, about 900, are at work, while others are idle. There are 400 out of work."

"What is the reason of so many being unemployed?"

"Well, those who went to the mills near Revelstoke found the climate of the mountains too cold. They came back to Vancouver, and though some got jobs, many are destitute. Another reason why some are out of work was trouble with the Royal City planing mills. There are 200 working there, and an arrangement was made that they should get \$1.50 a day, but when pay day came they only got \$1.25. Of course they quit. Many others have never secured employment."

"And what is the principal work of the employed?"

"There are about 200 at the American mill, and most of the rest work on the C.P.R. track running east from Vancouver. I like British Columbia very much, and believe I could get along well here, as I have received an English education," Mr. Mazoomdar concluded.

The Outlook In Klondike.

There is a note of real cheerfulness in the paragraph given below from The Dawson News. The means of communication with Klondike are such that it is now a good while past Thanksgiving, but the paragraph is worth reading, as showing that, in the opinion of those on the spot, Klondike is far from being a played-out mining camp. The note reads: "Today is Thanksgiving Day. Klondike is among the districts which can return thanks with no strain of the imagination. We can be thankful for the most perfect public health of any section of the Dominion; for the most glorious weather; for uninterrupted navigation; for a past season of activity and profit; for the doubling up of the value of claims; for an entire season of full employment for our workers; for a cessation of political wrangling; for the absolute promise of greater prosperity next year; for the close of a season more profitable to the country than last; for a year of no idleness in the camp which was not voluntary; for the restful certainty that the coming year is to require an army of employed double that of the last year; for a nearly complete absence of disaster, and for a well-stocked market and the wherewithal to purchase our turkey."

Lonely Labrador.

It keeps one busy these days to remain abreast of all that is going on in this big country. The geography of the West changes every week, but Labrador, the great eastern unknown land lying beside Canada's front door, is gradually awakening from the sleep of centuries. Dr. Wilfred Grenfell writes that the mission he represents is adding a fourth hospital in Canadian Labrador, which will be 200 miles from the nearest hospital. In this work Montreal, Halifax and Toronto have taken part, and the extension of the Government telegraph line of great assistance to these people who have never had a medical man among them before. With almost the same mail The Quebec Telegraph comes in with a report that owing to some mismanagement of the mails places from Natashquan eastward and northward failed to get their letters in September, and will not now receive them until the winter mail in January.

The Order Changeth.

There is a touch of sadness in the announcement that the Barnardo Farm House at Russell, Manitoba, is to be permanently closed. For twenty years the home has been a training school to teach farming to the boys sent out from England. Conditions have so changed, however, that the boys can be sent direct to the homes of farmers, and the institution is no longer necessary. Mr. E. A. Struthers, who has been in charge of the home since its erection, will now manage the distribution of Barnardo boys from the receiving home in Winnipeg. Mr. Struthers, who is a cousin of Mr. Irving Struthers, the well-known Montreal newspaperman, has managed the home with conspicuous success, and is regarded as a just and kindly foster-father by more men and boys than probably any other man in Canada.

COST OF BRITISH ELECTIONS.

Candidates' Expenses, Officially Returned, Totaled \$5,834,290.

London, Dec. 3.—A Parliamentary return of the "official" expenses of the candidates of the recent general election shows that it cost the 670 members of Parliament \$5,834,290 to obtain their seats, an average per vote of 88c.

The sum privately disbursed would substantially increase the total, judging from the evidence of some of the bribery trials, which followed the elections.
