Official advices state that the Japanese landed 600 soldiers near Ta-Lien Wan with disastrous results, 410 being sabred by the Cossacks. The remainder escaped to their ships. It is further stated that the Japanese landed at Dove bay, where 30 of them were killed and the remainder re-

The Daily Mail's New Chwang cor respondent, under date of Feb. 11, caresjondent, under date of Feb. 11, cables: "According to official Port Arthur telegrams, the Japanese landed a force yesterday at Pigeon bay, west of Port Arthur. They were then attacked by troops and by the batteries and were defeated with heavy 108s."

Che Foo, Feb. 15.—It is reported that 12,000 Japanese troops were landed at Dove bay last Wednesday morning and that they were met by the Russians, who engaged them in a hand-to-hand fight. The reports say the Japanese were driven back. t is also reported that Japanese troops have been landed 4t miles further west.

A reliable authority says that three

A reliable authority says that three Russian torpedo boats have been sunk by guns from the forts. They were mistaken for Japanese vessels.

It is stated that 11 Russian ships were damaged in the recent engagement at Port Arthur. The whole fleet has moved into the inner harbor. Torpedo boats remain outside on souting duty.

Five extra big guns have been mounted on the forts, and they are firing at every object suspected of being part of the enemy's fleet.

There are 400 Japanese still in Port Arthur, it is said, and there is some uneasiness concerning their safety. Refugees who have arrived here assert that they were thrown into prison and that their money and clothing were taken.

Fassengers who have arrived at Port Arthur say the Russian cruiser Askold was damaged in Tuesday's battle in the roads outside of Port Arthur, but was kept afloat till Saturday, when it sank, in 30 ffs.

NEUTRAL SHIPS RELEASED.

Yingkow, Feb. 14.—The administrative authorities at Port Arthur have formally notified the American and British authorities there of the release of the neutral ships which had been seized. Both consuls had asked for explanations. The civil administration of Port Arthur has furthmated that Viceroy Alexieff will not recognize the consuls in matters relating to Port Arthur and Manchuria.

The Russians are commandeering supplies at New Cowang and the Chinese are closing their shops and placing their -possessions under foreign protection. Russian residents at New Chwang, fearing that the army will be unable to protect them and their property are depositing their treasure under the judisdiction of foreign flags.

The Russian gunboat Mandjur, which before the war begun was preparing for sea has now gone several miles up the Wu-Sang river where

The Nanging viceroy has telegraph-instructions to the officials under his jurisdiction to observe strict neu-trality and to take measures to pre-vent anti-Christian and other dis-

Martial law is said to have been proclaimed at Vladivostock.
Viceroy Alexieff has ordered all foreigners and civilians to leave Port Arthur. The families of the Russian officers in Manchuria, are being sent to Russia, and this is causing great pressure upon the railway. Dalny was the first place to be deserted. The non-combatants and civilians have abandoned all their property at Port Arthur and Dalny.

The Russians freely admit that their unpreparedness for the Japaness attack to have been a iterrible blunder. Only half the ships were in line of battle and their fofficers were ashore celebrating the anniversary of Viceroy Alexieff's birth A stirring episode was the re-entrance into the harbor of the warships Czarevitch and Novik after the fight. They came in under their own steam, with bands playing and men cheering. Throughout the afternoon and night of Feb. 5 wounded men were being removed to the shore.
