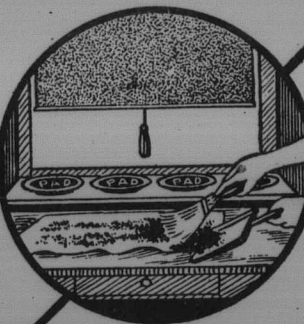

Brown Six-Row Potato Sprayer

BROWN POTATO SPRAYERS have for several years been the favorite with the potato growers on the St. John river for the reason that the clog proof nozzle makes it possible for the operator to spray for hours without stopping to clean the nozzles.

THE DOUBLE CYLINDER DISPLACEMENT PUMP takes its power from wheels by a convenient chain drive direct from axles thus doing away with side motion and drive chain trouble. The pump has brass plunger 2 1/8 inch in diameter, packed with graphite composition, from the outside thus assuring a high pressure at the nozzles. All check valves in pump are brass fitted to brass seats and can be easily ground or replaced. Large air chamber tested under higher pressure than assures a steady pressure at the nozzles.

REVOLVING TWIN PADDLES in tank to assure barrels mixture being well mixed when in operation.

THE HUNDRED GALLON TANK is square and of expross wood, with the top removable in case of any trouble in the tank, whereas with the barrel tank sprayer it is impossible to do this.

THE WHEELS ARE GENUINE SARVIAN WHEELS, 4 feet in diameter, with 3 inch tire, all of good material that will stand for years which is very necessary in a sprayer that is to carry 100 gallons.

THE AXLE is cold roll steel 1 3/4 inch in diameter and we have never yet known one to break.
