TO BE HANGED ON FIRST DAY OF MARCH

**NEWMAN CLARK IS SENTENCED
TO DIE ON MARCH 1**

Prisoner Displayed No Emotion When Capital Punishment Was Announced

Andover, N. B., Dec. 5.—Newman Clark, of Four Falls, was sentenced yesterday to be hanged on March 1, 1921, for the murder of Miss Phoebe Bell on March 25, 1914.

The sentence was pronounced by Judge Chandler immediately after the opening of the court. Clark displayed no emotion on hearing the sentence, and smiled as he left the court room. His mother was present.

The prisoner was obliged to stand when sentence was imposed and as he stood, resting his hands on a table, his body trembled slightly and his face twitched a little. For the first time since the trial began, the eyes failed to stare at the ceiling. They roamed from table to judge, from judge to spectators and when the pronouncement was made that will end his life, unless something intervenes.

In spite of most slippery streets and disagreeable weather the attendance at the evening service was large. The subject of the sermon was "The need of reality in religion." There were a good many speakers at the altar for pardon or sanctification, and the service continued till nearly 11 o'clock.

The workers have been encouraged by seeing seekers every night this week thus far. Praise services are being held every day from 11:30 a.m. till 1 p.m. All Christians are wanted to drop in to these informal meetings for a few minutes of prayer.

A great day is anticipated Sunday, for the faith of God's children in rising. The topics for the day will be as follows: The true source of encouragement—10 o'clock; "God's standard for a man"—2:30; The sin that cannot be forgiven—7 o'clock. We invite all Christians to co-operate with us as far as possible for a genuine revival in Hartland. Let us see how much you desire union.
