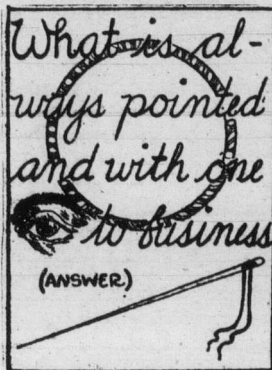

POLICE STARTED SCOTT ACT RAIDS ON THE LOCAL HOTELS

Small Quantities of Liquor Secured on Visits to the Lorne and City Hotels.

THE CHAIRMANSHIP OF POLICE COMMISSION

No Meeting of the Board Since Election, Said Chairman McKay This Morning.

Without waiting for the new Mayor to take his place as a member of the Police Commission Chief of Police McCollom has started a series of Scott Act raids.

Last evening the entire force with the exception of the Chief were despatched on a raid on the Lorne Hotel. The officers secured three baskets partly filled with a variety of liquors. The police said today that the value of the liquor seized at the Lorne Hotel was about \$50.

This morning Detective Roberts and Policeman Marshall made a raid at the City Hotel and secured about \$60 worth of liquor there. Mr. William McKay chairman of the Police Commission said this morning that the commission had not held a meeting since the election to re-organize or issue any instructions to the police. The raids are declared at City Hall to be a move by the Chief to get in right with the new regime.

It developed today that Mayor Hooper retired from the chairmanship of the Police Commission on November 6th, that Mr. McKay was then elected chairman and Mayor Hooper secretary. Mayor Mitchell may become the new secretary of the commission but Mr. McKay will probably remain chairman. No announcement of the changes was made today.

DOUGLAS WOMAN IS GRANTED A DIVORCE

Mrs. Ernest Waugh Sued Husband for Non-Support and Desertion in Maine.

Mrs. Bertie A. Waugh, formerly Miss Bertie Grant, of Douglas, has been granted a divorce from her husband, Ernest Waugh, in the Supreme Judicial Court of the State of Maine. Both parties were former residents of Douglas, where they were married by Rev. George Foster about thirteen years ago.

Action for divorce was brought by Mrs. Waugh at the December sitting of the court on the grounds of non-support and desertion. She is at present residing at her former home in Douglas, while her husband is in Maine.

The care of the three children, two sons, Claude and Donald Waugh, and one daughter, Pauline, are entrusted to Mrs. Waugh.

City Council Organized Slate of Committees Made Up And First Meeting Friday

New Legislation Committee Plan Additions to City Elections Act.

RECOUNT DECISION OFF UNTIL FRIDAY

Chairman Ebbett Makes Move to Straighten Out Street Lighting Department.

Fredericton's new City Council organized yesterday afternoon, partly framed their slate of committees and cleared the decks for action.

A special meeting will be held on Friday evening, when the committees named yesterday afternoon will be formally confirmed, the slate completed and the business of the year commenced. If Mayor Mitchell has an inaugural address it will be delivered at that meeting.

Two important matters to be decided at Friday night's meeting will be the decision on Candidate Farrell's application for a recount of the votes in the mayoralty contest and naming the date for the by-election to fill the vacancy in Carleton Ward's representation caused by the tragic death of Alderman-elect John Mavor.

Ald. Ebbett, the new chairman of the Street Lighting Department, made an early start yesterday towards getting the affairs of his department straightened out. The present plant is not capable of the work which it is being called upon to perform. Some drastic action must be taken and Ald. Ebbett wants the citizens to know what his committee are up against.

Two Committees Not Named.

Two committees were not named yesterday, one being that on Administration of Justice and the other that which will deal with the Wharves and Cemetery Departments. Ald. McKnight will be chairman of the latter committee, where his practical knowledge as an engineer will be of benefit in the wharf improvements that are planned. The new alderman for Carleton will be added dealing with Impoverishment of Justice Committee and will also have a place on the Assessment Appeals, Contingencies, Municipal Home, and Fire Committees.

Ald. Everett and Ald. Osborne, the only two members of the old Council who survived the election, retain the chairmanships they held last year and will be in charge of the Water and Sewerage and City Hall and Market committees respectively. Ald. Reid in the Finance Department, Ald. Wilkinson in the Fire Department, and Ald. Kitchen in the Roads and Streets Department are the chairmen of the committees which with the Water and Sewerage, constitute the important departments of the city corporation. The slate of committees as far as made up yesterday is published herewith.

ett, Ald. Lemont and Ald. Reid. The legislation to be submitted is in respect to proposed improvements in city's water supply, the Civic Publicity Act and amendments to the City Election Act.

In the latter bill it is expected that several amendments will be made to the bill as it already stands. A section will be added dealing with impersonations, which will make the act similar to the Provincial and Dominion Elections Act whereby an elector can vote even after he has been impersonated, providing he is otherwise qualified. The adding of this section is the result of two flagrant cases of impersonation which occurred at the civic elections on Monday, when two well known citizens lost their right to vote through being impersonated. The two gentlemen were Mr. William Owens and Mr. Alfred Barker, and both had votes at the City Hall poll. The act as it now reads does not give an elector the right to vote even if he has paid his taxes, after he has been impersonated, and the intention is to have the act read that an elector

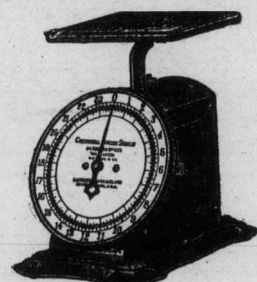
