Chicago, Ill., July 2.—While Charles In Relson, a stenographer, sat on a bench in Washington Park last night with his companion on a bicycle ride, Miss Margaret Staples, of No. 1,557 Michigan avenue, an unknown assasin fired three bullets at him-from the corner of a liac bush. A bullet entered Nelson's body near the heart, another pierced his neck, and the third wounded him in the fleshy part of the leg. Nelson was immediately taken to the hospital, where the physicians pronounced his wounts fatal. IS THIS A BLUFF?

London, July 2.—The Berlin correspondent of the Daily Mail asserts that Dr. J. W. Leyois, the Transvaal Secretary of State, has engineered a syndicate, ostensibly French, in order to conceal its political nature, which has bought up all the available share of the Mozambique company. The money is actually contributed, according to the correspondent, but the Transvaal Government and several German financial houses and the syndicate will pay Portugal a large sum for a new charter sto the Mozambique company, including the whele of Delagoa Bay, with its port, customs and entire administration. "Thus," continues the correspondent, "unless England acts quickly the Delagoa region will fall within the control of a Boer-German group."
