WELL DONE MONCTON! The city of Moncton gave its answer to the King-Copp-Veniot adm'nistration aggregation yesterday when the electors gave Mr. E.A Reilly, the Liberal-Conservative candidate a majority of 864 over the newly appointed Attorney-General of the Veniot administration Mr. Ivan C Rand. The campaign was a vigorous one and Premier Veniot made Moncton his headquar ters during the last week of the campaign. A feature of the campa'gn was the absence of Hon. A B. Copp from the constituency and his failure to accept the challenges of Mr. A. Douces, member for Kent to meet him on a common platfrom.

Provincial and Federal issues were intermingled in the campaign and the result clearly shows that the people of the Maritime provinces have been earnest in their protests against the treatment accorded them during the past two or three years. Mr. Relly's majority is a handsome one and should, if it does not, serve notice on Premier King and Prem'er Veniot that in future, New Brunswick and the Maritime provinces generally, ex-

pect fairness shown them by their governments, otherwise they must be prepared to take the consequen ces

smile has turned to a frown and there are more frowns coming their way, so " many in the near future that they won't know their faces when they behold them.






