

LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

The Session of the Imperial Parliament opened yesterday.

It is reported from London that the King and Queen will visit Paris in April.

The British freight steamer "Queen Louise" from Swansea, for New York, is ashore on the New Jersey Coast.

Aviator Garcia took five passengers 7382 feet up in the air at Charlottetown on the 5th making a new world's record.

The Board of Trade, of St. John announces that they have plans for having St. John dry dock enlarged to make it 1150 feet long.

It is stated at Ottawa that there is a strong probability of the term of H. R. H. the Governor-General being extended for another year.

Aviator Logsdon broke the world's record at Manohar for endurance flight. He remained in the air sixteen hours and twenty minutes having covered a distance of 1056 miles without landing.

A mid air collision on the 9th, between a biplane and a monoplane, at Johannesburg, Germany, caused the death of a German aviator and a pupil making his first flight alone.

After 21 years service on the Atlantic, the record breaking steamer Campana is to be sold. The new Aquilina is to replace her. The Campana has made 240 round voyages.

The King has given orders for improving conditions in part of Kensington, one of the worst of London's slums. As beneficiary of the Duchy of Cornwall estates he is a landlord.

General Huerta of Mexico has issued a decree authorizing the increase of the army by 50,000 men. This will make available a fighting force of 230,000 men. It promises to be an active campaign.

Five thousand Mexicans who had not had a bath for months, some longer, were forced into a bath house in squads of 25 by United States soldiers at El Paso Texas and made to take a thorough cleansing.

The London Daily News says Viscount Gladstone, Governor of South Africa, is to return home immediately and Sydney Buxton, President of the Board of Trade will succeed him. C. F. Masterman, is to be taken into the Cabinet.

Picking his men for the Antarctic Expedition Sir Ernest Shackleton says that they must be between 30 and 40 years of age, below 30 he says man is still in the making and is at his best between 30 and 40.

The wonderful operation of Ross Allen, a young Canadian in the city of Baltimore before reported, is proving a success. His nose and lips were torn off in a mill and now are being made from his arms.

Rescued from a waterlogged Schooner off the Nova Scotia Coast, Capt. John B. White and his crew of five of the schooner Lobosco arrived at New Orleans on a steamer which picked them up after a week's hard fight for life.

Rodman Wainwright of New York is financing and Glenn Currier is building a flying boat for a Transatlantic flight from Newfoundland to the Irish Coast, 1000 miles. An English Army officer said a United States Air are to operate the boat.

Bob Wright, farmer, aged forty, was killed and Mildred Bessey, aged 17, seriously injured when their buggy was hit by a Grand Trunk train at Leves Crossing Ontario in a snow storm. Three others in the buggy escaped.

A school teacher named Wagner at Heilbronn Germany has been sentenced to life in an asylum for criminal insanity. Last September he set fire to a village, murdered his wife and four children and ten villagers. The court found he suffered from the mania of persecution.

Forthright, Joseph Cassidy, a former Democratic Boss and Wm. Willett, former Congressman both of New York were sentenced for six months to a year in Sing Sing and pay a \$1,000 fine. Louis T. Waller, politician was sentenced to 9 months and pay \$1,000.

At the request of the British Admiralty Colonial Secretary Harcourt, has notified each British possession where oil deposits are found that they must be controlled solely by companies registered under the British flag and the majority of the directors of every company must be British.

There is lively interest in London over the challenge of Hon. Sam Hughes to the Coldstream Guards that he would pick from the Ottawa Garrison 30 men who would beat a similar number from the rank and file of the Coldstream at rifle shooting. It is likely the Coldstream will take up the challenge.

Divers have examined the wreck of the steamer Monroe, with which forty-two men went down to death near Norfolk Virginia and say the bodies and cargo can be saved but the vessel is a total loss. The bodies are in saloons and staterooms the collision with the steamer Nautucket so jammed the doors that explosives have to be used to open them.

In Boston on the 2nd Inst, McGill University defeated Harvard at hockey two to one. The score was tied at the end of the two twenty-minute periods. Hopkins having scored for Harvard in the first and Parsons for McGill in the second. The game played for a period of ten minutes without score, and then an indefinite session was ordered. After two minutes and forty-five seconds play Parsons drove the puck past Carroon, the Crimson goal-keeper.

His Lordship, Bishop O'Leary returned from the mainland yesterday.

A despatch received in St. John yesterday says that S. Albert Weimers of St. John was killed in San Francisco. He has been prominent newspaper man, and was for a long time city editor of the Boston Herald.

This is civic election day in Charlottetown.

The Provincial Legislature will convene for the despatch of business on Wednesday March 11th.

The redistribution bill was presented in the House of Commons yesterday by Premier Borden. The figures indicating the number of members are inserted for all the Provinces, except Prince Edward Island. The space for the Island is left blank. The bill is committed to a committee of seven, who will arrange boundary lines and other details and will determine what our representation shall be. Premier Borden made a strong and sympathetic speech in favor of our Island Province receiving special consideration, and not having its representation reduced.

The women arrested gave the names of Katherine Helesco, aged 55, and Alexandra Frederics, aged 22.

Mr. Lalonde states that after mumbleing some location one of the women handed back his roll apparently the same condition he received it, but the latter missed from it two bills, a twenty and a five. The operation was carried on before his eyes, and he could not see how the money was extracted.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

The applicant must be in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres wholly owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead for pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.


