Before the German boys leaves school his teach. er enters into communication with the parents, who are supplied with a pamphlet showing the chances and conditions in the various trades carried on in the neighborhood. Once established in workshop, the boy attends continu ation schools for four or six hours ; week. If the boy takes up an unskilled trade he will join a general continu intelligence; if he wants to be a shoe maker, a confectioner, or a composifor, he will join a technical course arranged with a special view to his rade; if he is a stonemason, a cabi netmaker, or a joiner, he will attend the building continuation school there are also commercial classes for the clerk or bookkeeper.
