**Street accidents in New York City** during the year 1912 caused the death of 532 persons. 230 of these victims were children, of whom 103 were run over by automobiles. Of the total deaths 221 were due to automobiles, 134 to trolley cars and 177 to wagons. During the same period 2,363 persons were injured. The deaths from these accidents in 1911 numbered 423. Ninety-one drivers of motor cars ran away after the accidents.

## Largely Attended

The body of the late John W. Green was removed from the morgue at noon to-day by Undertaker, Campbell, and taken to the home of Mr. E. J. Horwood, brother-in-law of the deceased. The funeral took place this afternoon and was largely attended. Prominent among the mourners were the members of the S. O. E. of which deceased was a member, and also the employees of the The Royal Stores. The coffin was covered with beautiful wreaths and floral offerings. Interment was at the General Protestant Cemetery.

## Attempted House-Breaking.

Wednesday night last a man tried to break into the residence of Mrs. B. Kelly, Water Street West, by forcing the rear door open. He wrenched the lock off and got inside but was blocked by a vestibule door which is in the hallway, and fearing he would arouse the household if he tampered with this, decamped. Next morning the broken lock was discovered, and evidently the fellow was bent on theft.

## Vandalism.

During yesterday some unknown person or persons entered the New Seamen's Institute with a bad intent for they broke a considerable portion of the wall plaster in the lower flat of the building as well as damaging the inventories. Manager Jones showed a Telegram reporter to-day the extent of the damage done and commented strongly against such conduct. Such acts of vandalism should not be tolerated and deserve the severest punishment. The police have been put on the qui vive and if any one is caught wilfully destroying property will be dealt with according to law.

The man did not enter the house but crossed Bowe's Bridge making towards Bay Bulls. Later a young chap named White, of Bay Bulls, said he met a stranger on the road that morning. He took him to be a sailor and gave him the description of the person given by him it would appear to be the man who called at Raymond's. He was going towards Bay Bulls. The friends of the missing man do not believe that he could have gone so far as he was ill and too weak to make such a long journey. Sunday night it blew and rained heavily and they think he could not have lived in such weather.
