VISIT OF HIS EXCELLENCY AND MRS. DAVIDSON.

The special train, bearing His Excellency and Mrs. Davidson, arrived here at 1:30 to-day. As previously arranged the citizens, with the Brigades, bands (3) and school children gathered at the Court House grounds at 2 o'clock where the brigades—C.C.C. and K.E.B.—were inspected by His Excellency while the bands played suitable selections. His Excellency and Mrs. Davidson then ascended the Court House steps where the citizens' committee were assembled. After a few very appropriate words from His Honor Judge Oke, Chairman of the Citizens' Committee, by way of introduction, he called upon the Secretary, Thomas Hanrahan, Esq., M.A., Inspector of Schools, to read the address of the citizens of this old town. Mr. Hanrahan read the document in a very clear voice, that could be heard distinctly by all the assembled crowd. His Excellency then thanked the people for their expressions of loyalty to the King and welcome to himself and Mrs. Davidson. He assured us that they both would do all in their power to advance the interest of Newfoundland. At the close of his remarks, hearty cheers were given for His Excellency and Mrs. Davidson. This was the signal for another pleasing event in connection with the visit. Four little girls—Frances Casey, Violet Pugh, Gwendolyn Heath and Emma Cron—then came forward and the first named presented Mrs. Davidson with a beautiful bouquet, provided by the children of the different schools. The little ones did their part well and were assured that the gift was very highly appreciated. A reception was then held in the Court House, and large numbers of our citizens called on and made the acquaintance of His Excellency and Mrs. Davidson. After a drive around town, viewing the principal places of interest, including the Marine Dock, factories, etc., the party were entertained at luncheon at the home of Judge and Mrs. Oke, Victoria Street. The day was all that could be desired. Our citizens turned out in holiday attire, and the first visit of Governor Davidson will long be remembered here.

The party goes to Carbonear to-night and will be entertained by the citizens of that town, to-morrow.

Circular Letter—The Peace of the Church.—Julliee.

Dear People—

Our Holy Father—PIUS X.—has issued a Decree ordering a general Jubilee to be held this year in Celebration of the Sixteenth Hundredth Anniversary of the

"Edict of Toleration"

published by the Emperor Constantine, in the year A.D. 313, by which an end was put to the terrible persecutions with which the Christians had been afflicted for three centuries, and peace proclaimed throughout the whole Christian world.

This great Jubilee of thanksgiving is announced to open on Low Sunday (Dominica in Albis) 30th March of the present year, 1913, and to continue until the Feast of the Immaculate Conception (8th December) next.

The conditions necessary for gaining the Plenary Indulgence of this Jubilee are the following:

For all people in Rome, (or who may be able to go there) to visit twice daily the Basilican Churches of St. John Lateran, St. Peter's, Prince of the Apostles; and St. Paul's, outside the walls; and there, for a short time pour forth prayers to God for the prosperity and exaltation of the Apostolic See; for the extirpation of heresy; for the conversion of all those in error; for concord among Christian Princes, and for peace and unity of the whole Body of the Faithful; according to the mind of the Pope; and once during the time of making these visits, to make a good Confession and receive the Holy Communion, and, also, to give, each one according to his capacity, some alms to the poor, or to assist some pious work.

For those not able to be present in Rome—the visits are to be made to the Church or Churches which may be designated by the Bishop. The graces and Indulgences of this Jubilee are, as usual applicable to the souls of the Faithful departed.

For the people of St. John's and its neighbourhood—We designate the Cathedral and the Churches of St. Patrick and St. Joseph. Six visits are to be paid in all, and they may be paid to either of these Churches. The nuns and religious who may not be able to visit these Churches may gain the Indulgences by making the visits in the Chapels or Choirs of the Convents.

In the Outposts the Parish Priest shall arrange as to the Churches to be visited. The Indulgence may be gained at once by any persons who may wish to fulfil the conditions from henceforth.

By and by towards the Autumn time, the Jubilee visits will be performed in a more solemn and public manner in St. John's by the Schools and Religious Societies in public processions within the Church grounds.

The Church will be used as the Parish Church for the large congregation which in these latter years has sprung up in this part of Rome.

To Select Head of Benedictines.

Rome, May 10.—Eighty abbots of the Benedictine Order, including several from the United States, assembled in Rome to-day in order to select a new abbot general who will have the direction of the affairs of the order throughout the world. The Benedictines form one of the oldest of religious associations. The order was founded early in the sixth century by St. Benedict, who introduced monastic life into western Europe. No religious order has been so remarkable for extent, wealth and men of note and learning as the Benedictines. The order is said to have had 40 Popes, 230 Cardinals and several thousand Archbishops and Bishops. Numerous emperors and kings of long ago also belonged to the order. The Benedictines have never taken a prominent part in politics, but have produced many literary works.

A Splendid Park.

It is undoubtedly a pleasure to take a walk through Victoria Park off Water Street West. The place exhibits the care and attention bestowed on it, and no wonder that it is a popular resort each evening for toll-worn citizens. The well ordered gravelled walks laid to seats which invite the hiker to recline in them, and the beautifully kept flower plots and beds delight the senses with their pretty appearance and the inhalation of most sweet perfumes. The new central gate leading from Water St. is a much needed improvement. The band stand has been neatly painted and everything is spick and span for the summer. The caretaker, Mr. Jno. Ryan, is an artist in his profession as a gardener and cultivator of flowers, and is to be congratulated on the excellence of the park.

Attempted Rescue of Prisoner.

On Water Street, at the foot of Prince's Street, last night, Constable Blundon arrested a man who was under the influence and who violently resisted arrest. While the officer was struggling with him and trying to handcuff him, a companion of the prisoner repeatedly assaulted Blundon, and eventually took the prisoner from him and both were going up Prince's Street, when officers Day and Mahoney appeared on the scene. They grappled with the men, assisted by Blundon, and after a hard battle the prisoners were overpowered and manacled and marched to the police station.
