## FATAL FIRE AT QUEENSBOROUGH.

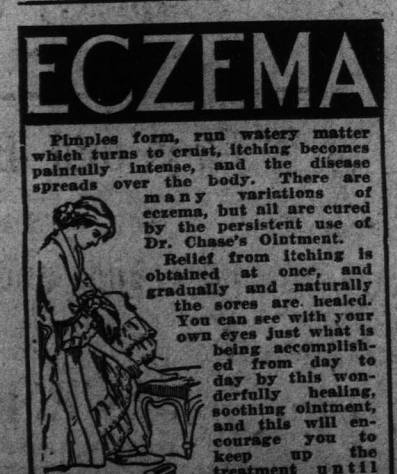
NEW YORK, To-day.  
Seven persons, all officers and office  
employees of an oak and dry manu-  
facturing company, were burned to  
death; two others are missing and it  
is feared have lost their lives in a fire  
which destroyed two factories in the  
manufacturing section of Queensbor-  
ough to-day with a loss of \$250,000.

BRITAIN WAITING FOR U. S. TO  
SPEAK.

LONDON, To-day.  
The British Government will not  
make any official representation to the  
States concerning the German sub-  
marine U-53, pending the announce-  
ment of its attitude by the Ameri-  
can Government, said Viscount Grey in the  
House of Lords to-day. In reply to a  
question concerning the attitude of  
the States toward British patrols, Vis-  
count Grey said the States admitted  
that British ships were not exceeding  
their legal rights under international  
law, but that the American Govern-  
ment complained of their presence on  
the ground of the irritation which the  
continued presence of belligerent war  
ships off the U. S. coast naturally caused  
a neutral country. He declared  
that the States requested Britain very  
emphatically not to patrol off its coast  
and said instructions were sent to the  
British ships there to avoid causing  
any unnecessary irritation and to comply  
as far as possible with the Ameri-  
can request. With regard to the U-53  
the Foreign Secretary continued, "We  
do not know whether it is true that  
American warships present on the sub-  
marine's way. That is a matter for  
the American Government only. We  
assume that that Government is mak-  
ing full inquiries, and we also assume  
it will announce its attitude in due  
course, pending that we do not propose  
to make any official representation on  
the subject of the submarine."

## TROUBLE IN ATHENS.

ATHENS, To-day.  
Marines from the ships of the En-  
tente Powers occupied the railway  
station at Piræus and several build-  
ings in Athens. Immediately this be-  
came known the streets of Athens  
swarmed with Greeks frantically  
cheering Constantine and chanting  
the Greek National Anthem. Great  
crowds marched through the streets,  
thousands gathering in the neighbor-  
hood of the post office square. War  
Minister Dracopis ordered out the Greek  
troops and marines to guard every ap-  
proach to the square in order to pre-  
vent any clash between the Greek civi-  
lians and French, who occupied that  
section, establishing a complete cor-  
don about the French and taking all

the body of the Commander. We cap-  
tured 55 machine guns.

## BRITISH STEAMER SUNK.

LONDON, To-day.  
The British steamer Welsh Prince,  
4,934 tons gross, and owned at New-  
castle, has been sunk.

## NO CONSCRIPTION YET.

LONDON, To-day.  
An indication that the Government  
does not intend to have recourse im-  
mediately to conscription in Ireland  
was given in the Lords to-day by Earl  
Derby, Under-Secretary for War, in  
reply for voluntary recruiting in Ire-  
land, to which he hoped there would  
be a worthy response.

## SNOWSTORM IN QUEBEC.

QUEBEC, To-day.  
Quebec since about 10 o'clock last  
night has been in the grip of a regular  
Xmas snowstorm. It started with a  
forty mile gale and reports from vari-  
ous places down the Gulf and River  
and up as far as Three Rivers indicate  
that a severe snowstorm is raging. An  
inch of snow has fallen in this city.

STEPHANO'S CREW HOMEWARD  
BOUND.

HALIFAX, To-day.  
Twenty-two of the crew of the  
Stephano, which was sunk by the  
German submarine U-53, arrived to-  
night from New York. They came on  
a steamer which left New York on  
Saturday, and which followed along  
the shore within the three mile limit  
till darkness fell. A straitly course  
was then made for the open Atlantic,  
but the usual track of steamers avoid-  
ed. Those who arrived here all belong  
to Newfoundland, their homes being in  
St. John's, for which port they are  
now bound. Expecting to leave to-  
morrow via the Cape route, the ship-  
captain of the Stephano remained  
at New York.

## WAR REVIEW.

LONDON, To-day.  
Volhynia, Galicia and Transylvania  
are still the points where the severest  
fighting is taking place. Along the  
Somme front in France bombard-  
ments alone have prevailed, except in  
Bely-en-Santerre, where the Germans  
threw two attacks against the French  
which were repulsed. In Macedonia  
hostilities have been confined mainly  
to patrol engagements and artillery  
duels. Bad weather in Transylvania  
has taken place. In Transylvania the  
Russians fighting near the border  
pass continue tenaciously to hold  
back the Austro-Hungarian forces  
everywhere. In the Ural Valley they  
have driven the invaders back across  
the Rumanian border.

## TINO AS RHETORICIAN.

ATHENS, To-day.  
The King issued the following order  
of the day to the officers and sailors:  
"In these hours when stricken and  
with hearts bleeding each new moment  
from new wounds deep in our souls,  
which so short a time ago were  
in a united and victorious Greece, my  
Government has been besieged to or-  
der you to leave the ships upon which  
you brought the news of the freeing of  
our liberated brothers. You came  
with tortured hearts and eyes wet  
with tears, every man faithful to his  
duty, and you have given so much  
for and are ready to suffer all.  
May our hopes soon be realised, and  
may the hour soon come when you  
will be able to return to your ships.  
The Holy Ikens that have protected  
you in the past will protect you in the  
future. The glorious flag once again  
caught by the winds of the Greek seas  
will bring hope and consolation  
wherever Greek hearts beat for their  
Nation and King."

## Here and There.

THE SUSU.—The s.s. Susu left Cat-  
alina early this morning, going north.

GOOD WATER SUPPLY.—There  
was much favorable comment around  
town about the excellent supply of  
water in evidence at yesterday even-  
ing's fire, which contributed in no  
small measure towards the subduing  
of the fire so promptly and effectually.

BARRE'S NEW PURCHASE.—Mr. G.  
Barre's newly purchased schooner  
Benevolence, Capt. Eugene M. Burden,  
reached port yesterday afternoon in a  
three days from Lunenburg. She will  
shortly load fish for the European  
markets, being well fitted for crossing  
the Atlantic.

## Albania

The tense interest of the Macedoni-  
an and Rumanian situation is pre-  
venting the Italian occupation of Al-  
bania from attracting the attention  
that it deserves. The Italian troops  
at Argyrocastro (a spot made fairly  
famous by Byron's notes to "Childe  
Harold") are distinctly on Greek  
ground, and they menace Janina it-  
self. At the same time they are reach-  
ing northeastward toward Monastir.  
Their occupation of this Albanian re-  
gion may not be regarded as perman-  
ent, but they are certainly on the east-  
ern shore of the Adriatic to stay, and  
they will probably make the destiny  
of Albania (which has now proved  
that it can never have a future of its  
own) Italian, rather than Hellenic.  
The delicate diplomatic situation  
now be in progress somewhere among  
the Entente Allies regarding this Ad-  
riatic region. How far shall Italy  
come, and how far Serbia? And where  
must Hellas stay? We may assume  
that the Allies are postponing diplo-  
matic questions until the military  
ones are answered, but we may be  
quite sure that the future is being  
deeply considered at Rome, at the lit-  
tle fugitive court of the old king of  
Serbia, at Athens and at Paris and  
London. The Allies will wait for  
the solution of all these ques-  
tions, big with the fate of the Balkan  
and Mediterranean peoples, but some  
regard will have to be paid, after all,  
to the complicated and solid occu-  
pancies. The chances are that trans-  
Adriatic Italy will consist of consid-  
erably more than the port of Valona  
when the final "clean up" comes. And  
it will be quite natural, for the Al-  
banian streak in the Italian blood is  
strongly marked. The kinship of the  
Albanians to the Skopetians is intima-  
te.—Boston Transcript.

## Your Boys and Girls.

The very biggest and sunniest

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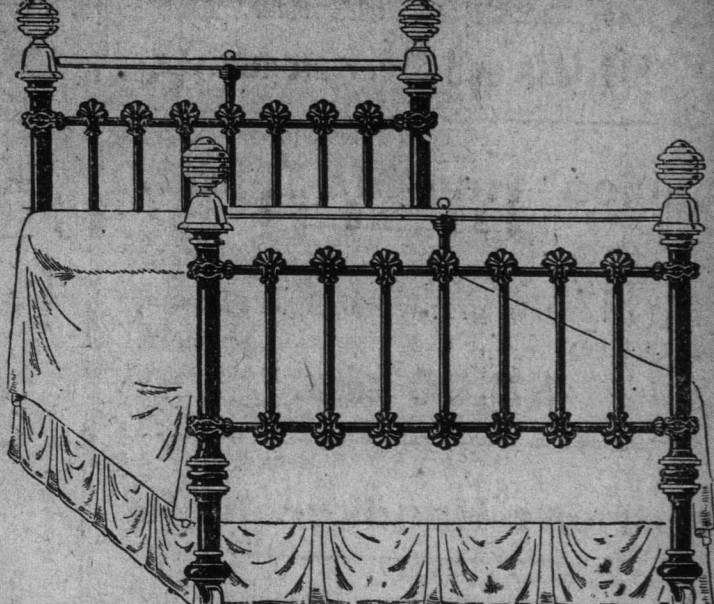
