WASHINGTON, Feb. 17. American Labor endorsement the war aims asserted by President Wilson, and the recognition that the war against Prussianism is a work ingman's war, is recorded in the declaration issued to-night by the Executive Council of the American Federation of Labor at the close of a seven days' session, at headquarters The declaration says that peace parleys between Russia and Germany have shown the futility of diplomatic negotiations until German is conquered.
