FRIDAY, July 29th. The Council met at 4 p.m.

The Committee on the Bill entitled
"An Act for the protection of Neglected and Delinquent Children" sat, and after a short debate rose and reported The Bill ratifying a contract with

the Pulp and Paper Corporation of America, went through the Committee Stage.
