The new British Cabinet was announced this evening as follows: President of the Council, Lord Salisbury; Lord High Chancellor, Viscount Cave; Chancellor of the Exchequer, Stanley Baldwin; Secretary for Home Affairs, Wm. Marquis Curzon; Secretary for India, Viscount Duffry; Secretary for War, Earl Derby; Secretary for the Admiralty, Lt.-Col. M. S. Amery; President Board of Trade, Mr. Philip Lloyd; Secretary of Health, Sir Arthur Griffith-Boscawen; Minister of Agriculture, Sir Robert Sanders; Secretary of Education, Viscount Novart; Attorney-General, Viscount Hogg; Secretary of Dominion Affairs, W. A. Weston; Secretary of Education, Ed. Wood.

**GENERAL MANIFESTO ISSUED.**  
LONDON, Oct. 24. The general manifesto of the Independent Liberal Party issued to-day reads as follows: "The position has been declared in confusion and discord, and behind it an unexampled record of extravagance and failure. It is the duty of the Liberal Party to secure the peace and stability of the Empire, and to secure the League of Nations."

BIRMINGHAM, England, Oct. 24. George Cadbury, cocoa and chocolate manufacturer, founder of the model village of Bourneville, died to-day, aged 83. (George Cadbury, who will be best remembered as the founder of the Model Village of Bourneville, where his chocolate plant is situated, was born at Edgbaston, in 1839.
