## Clergymen Ask Griffith to Film the Life of Christ.

While D. W. Griffith was working out some further production niceties in "Orphans of the Storm," his lates picture sensation founded on Kat Claxton's "The Two Orphans," and which under a United Artists Corporation release, is coming to the Majestic Theatre to-day, the suggestion was made by a group of clergymet representing several denomination that he make, as his next picture the Life of Christ.

The clergy have been enthusiastice followers of Mr. Griffith's work since "The Birth of a Nation" days. All extremes of religious thought were represented, in the group that saw him, ranging from Dr. John Talbot Smith, distinguished Catholic author and founder of the Actors' Guild, to Dr. Christian F. Reisner, the big "publicity man" of the Methodist Episcopal church.

It is estimated that during the New York one-year's run of "The Birth of a Nation" 5,000 clergymen asw the production. Subsequently, Mr. Griffith appeared before the M. E. Church centenary celebration at Columbus, Ohio, and his screen works are alike on the Catholic and the Methodist "white lists" of approved films.

"The sacred story has long been in my thoughts," said Mr. Griffith to the clergymen. "You can be assured that it will receive even deeper consideration since you have thus broached it. There are many practical difficulties. There has been, I regret to say, a staginess about biblical representations that has had just the opposite effect of what was intended. Penhaps by indirection of a Holy Land romance a bigger message will be conveyed than through the effort to transfer the Gospels to the screen. In the course of the spring I shall go over my tentative plans and will be glad to advise you whether the theme that you present is practicable at the present time."
