Life More Abundant

This is the God-given message of the Easter-tide: "I am come that they might have life, and that they may have it abundantly."

This is the message the risen Christ brought to his disciples on that first Easter morning. The authorities had laid him in the rock-hewn tomb, and had sealed it with a huge stone, and had set soldiers to watch it. They might as well have tried to chain the sun, or tie Niagara with a cotton string. As easily and quietly as the sun slips over the Eastern hills did the Lord Jesus come forth; the grave could not hold him. And why? Simply because life cannot be fettered. And so the open sepulchre of Jesus proclaims the glory of victorious life. And this is the message of the risen Christ to his troubled disciples. There in the garden he meets Mary. Her heart is filled with sorrow and her soul is crushed with defeat. Jesus calls her name, and she beholds her Lord. And then the gates of life swing wide to the woman's soul. Jesus walks with the two disciples to Emmaus, and their hearts burn within them. He calls from the Galilee shore to the weary, discouraged fishermen, and a new world opens to them. He meets the five hundred on the mountain-top and heneath bonds and imprisonment are the badges of victory. He rises from Olivet on wings of light to realms of glory before the eyes of his disciples and the church begins to sing, "O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?"

There are some who say that immortality is conferred on them that it is achieved. And both are right. The land of promise was given by God to Abraham and his children. But they had to fight for every foot of the land they possessed. It was both conferred and achieved. So eternal life is the gift of God. But this does not preclude the toil and struggle necessary to its attainment. Life must do more than simply exist; it must grow. So, then, eternal life is not the terminus of soul development. It is the glorious discovery and the triumphant exercise of the faculties and powers of the soul. Jesus, in his resurrection, gave the world a vision, not only of the beauty and glory of life, but also of its power and possibility. He showed how life can triumphantly break all barriers and rise above all apparent defeat.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES

EASTER HOLIDAY MAKERS IN ENGLAND.

LONDON, April 21.
Brilliant weather prevailed throughout England for Easter travel records for the last ten years were broken. Transportation companies report twenty thousand persons went to France alone for the holidays.

8,000 EMIGRANTS IN A MONTH.

LONDON, April 21.
Liners sailing from the Clyde in the next fortnight for Canada will carry three thousand emigrants, making over eight thousand sailing from the Clyde ports for Canada since March 15.

AGITATION AGAINST IRAK TREATY.

BAGDAD, April 21.
Agitation against the acceptance of the Anglo-Irak Treaty, and the subsidiary agreement between Great Britain and Irak indicates that the constituent assembly will refuse to ratify all pacts, unless they are substantially modified. One main point of the agitators is that Great Britain fails to guarantee Mosul Vilayet will not be surrendered to Turkey.

NO THREAT INTENDED.

WASHINGTON, April 21.
A specific disclaimer of any intent to convey a veiled threat in the use of the phrase "Grave Consequences," in his recent communication to Secretary Hughes, protesting against the Japanese exclusion features of the Immigration Bill as made by Ambassador Hanhara in his second letter to the secretary was made public by the State Department. Mr. Hughes' letter says in the light of the contents of the original letter and the prevailing friendship, and understanding, between two countries, he had no doubt that the words "Grave Consequences" were to be taken in the same sense "as you have stated, and I was quite sure that it was far from your thoughts to express or imply any other thought."

ARCHBISHOP ROCHE IN MONTREAL.

MONTREAL, April 21.
Returning from New York to Newfoundland, the Right Rev. E. P. Roche, Archbishop of St. John's, arrived in Montreal by motor to-day and will spend two or three days in the city.

ROBBERY OF \$12,000 IN BRONX.

NEW YORK, April 21.
Five nattily dressed young men walked into the back room of Bronx Cigar Store late to-night and held up forty card players, robbed them of money and jewellery, totalling \$12,000, and escaped in a motor car which they found at the curb. The car was the property of one of the card players. Four customers who entered the store to purchase tobacco were also robbed.

PRIME MINISTER SUGGESTS GENERAL ACCEPTANCE.

YORK, England, April 21.
Taking Reparation 'Experts' report as a whole and putting it into operation all at once with everybody back of it was the course advocated by Prime Minister Macdonald in addressing a crowded Labor meeting in the Theatre Royal here Saturday. He urged that the Allies should accept Germany's word and advocated her admission into the League of Nations, as another step for bringing peace on the Continent.

BOYCOTT DECLARED.

TOKIO, April 21.
The Japanese Printing Association at a general meeting here has decided to place a boycott on all goods from the state of California.

HONOLULU, April 21.

The Nippon Jiji, local Japanese language paper, received a special despatch from Tokyo stating that U.S. Ambassador Woods has cabled President Coolidge asking him to veto the immigration bill.

STRATFORD-ON-AVON, April 21.

Miss Correll, the English author and writer of scores of popular romantic tales, died here this morning from an attack of heart trouble. She had been ill recently, but was improving when the fatal seizure came.

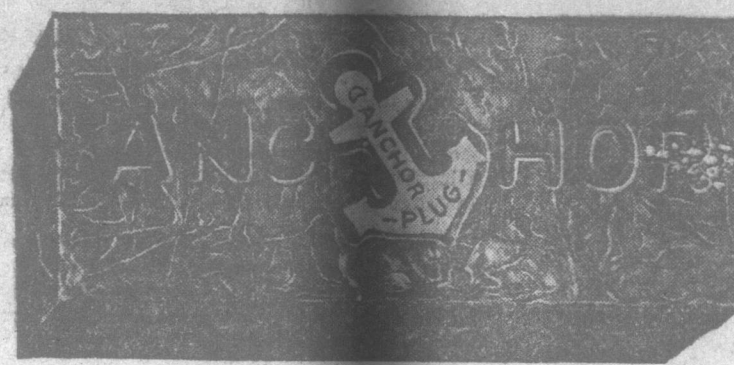
PITTSBURGH, April 21.

Madame Eleonora Duse, the famous Italian tragedienne, died here this morning at a hotel where she had been confined for two weeks with an attack of influenza. Mme. NEW YORK, April 21.
