Memorial Service  
in BrooklynEditor of the Evening Telegram,  
St. John's, Nfld.

Dear Sir,—I beg to ask your kind permission to insert in the columns of your esteemed paper, the following facts relative to a Memorial Service, conducted in the First Free Methodist Church, Brooklyn, N.Y., in memory of Mr. Bernard Pottle, who died at English Har., T.B. in July.

A service was conducted in the above mentioned Church on August 31, 1924 at 10:45 a.m. in memory of Brother Pottle, a much loved and esteemed member of that church. Miss Stella Davis of Saff. Har., Nfld., and Miss Gladys Arnold of Glovertown assisted in advertising the Service, which was attended by 124 persons, mostly Newfoundlanders, a goodly number for the holiday season.

The congregation, led by Rev. W. E. Frederick, sang the hymns "Thy Will Be Done," "Asleep in Jesus," and "How Sweet the Hours of Closing Day." After the Scripture selections, II Cor. 5:1-10 and Romans 8:35-39 were read, Mr. B. J. Wornell of Greenspond read a letter Rev. Frederick received from the deceased brother's pastor at English Har., and Mr. B. Guy read a letter from Brother Pottle's wife. The theme of both communications was that of gratitude to the Brooklyn friends and of his "Lively Faith." Mr. H. Pedlar's tribute was read by Mr. S. Jones. Rev. Frederick's text for the occasion was Number 23, 10. The audience was appreciative and attentive throughout the service. Thanking you for space.

## "Chief White Elk" Again

Florence.—A man who calls himself the Chief White Elk of the Canadian Iroquois tribe has been touring Italy this summer and has just arrived in Florence. He receives a warm welcome everywhere, for he distributes money and jewels with lavish generosity among the people and appears in public in full Red Indian war attire with a head-dress of feathers.

When in Rome, White Elk was received by the Pope and, by Signor Mussolini. He has bought a large property near Florence and has expressed his intention of settling permanently in Italy.

"Chief White Elk" when he came to England in January, 1923, said he was seeing the King on behalf of his people and bringing Canadian Boy Scout gifts for the Prince of Wales. Daily Mail inquiries showed that the Indian Department of the Canadian Government had no official knowledge of his visit and that he had not been entrusted by the general body of Canadian Boy Scouts with any mission. He is stated to have been a member of a Vancouver theatrical company and appeared in English music-halls.

## Mystery of the Sea

LOST VESSEL DECLARED TO BE  
OVERLOADED.

When the s.s. Nunnington left Swansea with a cargo of coal for France on April 11 last, she carried a crew of 14 hands, and her value was about £16,000. Since that date she has completely disappeared. Sir Marlay Sanson, who conducted an inquiry into the mystery at Swansea, held, in his judgment, that the boat was of a good and seaworthy condition, and that she was properly supplied with boats, life-saving appliances, and distress signals, but that she was never tested at any time for stability before proceeding to sea with a homogeneous cargo. As there were no survivors, the actual cause of the disappearance of the vessel was a matter for conjecture, but the Court held that she was not loaded so as to ensure safe stability, and was of the opinion that, in view of the somewhat heavy weather in the Bristol Channel on April 11 and 12, that the cargo in No. 2 hold shifted, and that, by reason of the vessel not being in proportion, being overloaded and of insufficient stability, she capsized and foundered during the early morning of April 12. The Court found that when the ship sailed she was unsafe, because she was not in proper trim, because she was overloaded, and because she was of insufficient stability. The Nunnington was owned by Messrs. Lythgoe, Prince & Co., Newcastle-on-Tyne.
