

The City and the Road Grant

Last week I published a fac-simile copy of a letter from the Secretary of the Municipal Council in which it was stated (a) THAT THE CITY RECEIVED FROM THE GOVERNMENTS IN GRANTS FOR THE MAINTENANCE AND UPKEEP OF CITY STREETS, ANNUALLY, THE SUM OF \$5,807.50; (b) THAT UNDER THE PER CAPITA GRANT, THE CITY WAS ENTITLED TO \$70,000.00.

This statement from the Secretary of the Municipal Council has called for considerable comment and a certain amount of unbelief, but read the following from the "Trade Review" of Saturday, November 21st: "THERE IS A ROAD GRANT ABOUT \$87,000.00 ALLOCATED YEARLY TO ST. JOHN'S EAST AND WEST. BUT THE CITY COUNCIL GETS ONLY ABOUT \$5,000 OF IT. THE REST IS SPENT IN THE OUTPORTS NEAR THE CITY BY THE GENERAL GOVERNMENT THROUGH THE MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY."

That's fairly definite, isn't it?

BILLIARDS.

Hints For Beginners.

Before beginning to deal with actual strokes and the building up of breaks, the following suggestions are offered and the writer asks that those interested in this series read them over carefully:—

1. If tall, bend down to your strokes so that you can get well behind the ball and be able to see the object balls and angles better.
2. Chalk your cue frequently but more especially when playing side strokes, and don't forget to chalk the sides of your tip as well as the middle.
3. Concentrate your mind on the game.
4. Try very hard indeed to get yourself opposite your strokes, so that you can strike where you really intend to.
5. Think always whether or not you are hitting your ball in the middle.
6. Never jerk up your cue at the close of a stroke; let it follow well through.
7. Don't move when playing any stroke. Keep your position until the ball has hit or missed.
8. Never get up on the table, use the rests for shots you cannot reach; that's what the rest is for,—to make things comfortable for you. Insist that your opponent keep to the floor also.
9. If you are playing a hard game or a tournament, keep your eyes off the score board and make every shot as if it were the deciding one. Above all try to keep the "white" on the table; you don't know when it may take you out of a hole.
10. Remember that a losing hazard, i.e.—when you go in off—is nearly always better than a pot, as you have a big advantage in being able to place your ball anywhere inside the D for the next stroke.






