Presentation to the Mechanics' Library, Montreal.

On Tuesday evening last, a bust of the Hon. John Young was presented to the Mercantile Library Association of Montreal. Mr. Young having been from his early youth one of the leading friends and supporters of that institution. A suitable reply having been made by the Chairman of the evening. Mr. Young, in the course of some remarks, gave the following sketch of his own history:

"I was one of a family of seventeen calldren. I was obliged to leave school at the early age of thirteen to provide for myself and help the others. My first employment was that of a schoolmaster. From thirteen to fifteen I kept school in the Parish of Coylton, near Ayr, in Scotland, and at one time had over thirty-five scholars. (Renewed laughter.) My dear old master and venerable friend John Torrance, Esq., at this time visited his native place, and called on my parents, and I was delighted by his engaging me to come to Montreal. I arrived here in 1826, having just completed my fifteenth birthday. Books at that time were to me an imperative necessity. I could not buy them, and the Montreal Library, in Little St. James street, was the only one then in Montreal, which was afterwards purchased by this Association. After paying for board and lodging, my income the first year was only forty dollars, and I gave a fith part of this to be a subscriber to the Montreal Library. (Loud cheers.) Burns says.

London, Jan. 15.—A despatch from Hong Kong, just received, states that a strong rebel force had captured the city Hokahadi in Japan. The persons and property of foreigners were respected.

Lisbon, Jan. 15.—Rio Janeiro dates to December 24th, state that the Allied army had made a vigorous assault on the Paraguayan stronghold, at Vilatta, and after a desperate battle, succeeded in carrying it. President Lopez's army was utterly destroyed. The allied army captured over 3,000 prisoners of war. Lopez himself, with barely 2,000 men made good their escape. This important victory opens the way to Ascuncion, the capital, to which place the Brazilian iron-clads have gone.

Paris, Jan. 15.—The public newspapers reports that the Conference on the Eastern question held an harmonious session today, and adopted unanimously alconconciliatory resolution. Mr. Rangabe was not in attendance. His absence is regarded as a refusal by Greece to recognize the conference.

American Despatches

Washington, 15th—The Committee appointed to examine into the election frauds in New York returned this morning. The evidence taken is very great and shows that gross frauds were perpetrated. A bill is soon to be prepared authorizing the admission of Virginia upon the adoption of the proposed Constitution with the obnoxious clause in regard to disfranchisement, the test oath, and probably some other objectionable features stricken out. It is believed it will be followed by an, Amnesty Bill, either universal or with some few exceptions, to take effect in the ratification of the Constitution. It is said that this adjustment meets the approbation of Gen. Grant and a large number of the most prominent members of Congress. There is no doubt whatever that the Senate will reject the treaty by which Mr. Seward agreed to pay seven millions and a half for St. Thomas. There is a disposition, however, to soften this decision towards the Danish government, as all Senators conversant with the subject sympathize with that Government for the unpleasant position in which it has been placed.
