The Ethiopian empress, Zaditou, recently paid a visit to Albert, King of Belgium. This is considered to be a repetition of the act of the Queen of Sheba and King Solomon. Empress Zaditou sent rich gifts which consisted of a collection of precious stones found in the Abyssinian hills and valued at several hundred thous-The Argonaut states and francs. that she also sent an Eighth Century of the story of Solomon and Sheba. As an evidence of her good will, she sent word to King Albert that there

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
