THE WEATHER PROPHET.

TORONTO, Oct. 17-11 p.m.—The depression
passing over the lakes yesterday has caused
moderate to fresh gale in that district. It was
observed this morning by another depression,
which developed over the New England
States. This is causing a fresh gale in the
Maritime Provinces to-night. Minimum
temperatures to-day: Montreal, 39°-50°;
Winnipeg, 39°-48°; Port Arthur, 34°-44°;
Toronto, 41°-55°; Kingston, 40°-50°; Mon-
real, 40°-50°; Quebec, 41°-55°; Halifax, 38°-50°.

TODAY'S PROBABILITIES.
Tomorrow, Oct. 18-19 a.m.—The indica-
tions for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes
region covering the peninsula and as far
east as Belleville are: Winds shifting to
easterly; fair during the day; some rain at

—The Bishop of Huron preached in

—The Medical Health Officer has reported
a case of typhoid fever located on Horton
street.

—Maurice Searrow has removed his trunk
and harness factory to 195 Dundas street,
west of Crystal Hall.

—Mr. C. B. Armstrong, of this city, has
been in Dresden this week straightening out
Grover & Co.'s affairs.

—Miss Lydia Thompson, of Warwick, has
accepted a position in Messrs. R. J. Young
& Co.'s establishment in this city.

—The reading and filing of Dr. Balfour's
monthly report constituted the business of
yesterday's session of the Hospital Trust.

—Mlle. Girard's mammoth minstrel
combination comprising twenty female
artists will be at the Grand this evening.

—The body of Archie Cameron, of West-
minster, who died on Tuesday, was interred
in the Presbyterian Cemetery, St. Thomas,
on Thursday.

—District Master Workman Bro. Joseph
Marks, of the R. of L., this city, addressed a
Stratford audience last evening on "The
Power of Money."

—In the absence of Col. Lewis, who is on
a visit to the Pacific slope, Trustee T. H.
Purdon has been appointed chairman of the
Hospital Trust.

—Sheriff Glass is away on a business trip
to Winnipeg, looking after some property
of his in that vicinity which has lately been
greatly increased in value.

—The "Two Old Chums" comedy organ-

fight to the finish on Navy Island. Miss
Leslie has a standing challenge of \$500,
open to the entire world.

—Thomas Garner, a dray man, was
charged at the Police Court this morning
with allowing an unlicensed person to drive
his wagon. It appears Garner has four
licenses and allows his son Frederick to
drive one dray. The Chief of Police
thought the boy was not capable of the
task and refused to allow him to do so. Mr. Esery argued
for the defense. The Magistrate imposed a
fine of \$1 or three days.

—Nearly every morning for the past
week has brought a number of supplicants
to the Mayor's office, praying that they
may be given time to pay their taxes.
Payment is being enforced in order to ex-
pedite the return of the rolls to the City

Such was the cast of characters in the
production at the Grand Opera House last
evening of the Wagnerian opera "Lohen-
grin" by the renowned Miss Emma Juch
and her supporting company of 150 people.

The audience was large and evidently criti-
cal, and to say that they appreciated the
performance would be mildly repre-
senting the enthusiasm which was from
time to time evinced. In Emma Juch
herself there is that captivating
power of a whole-souled personality, which
added to the sweetest of soprano voices, in-
sures her success and has given her the
place she occupies in the hearts of the
American public. She possesses a hand-
some face which reflects her thoughts and
feelings—and she feels every note she sings.

Only Gail, Charles Belmont's tenor was
Ortrud, by Georgine Von Jaunshowsky.
The power of supporting even Emma Juch, while
her power of portraying hatred and jealousy
was displayed to a height of dramatic
intensity which to excel would appear im-
possible. Franz Vetta made a good King
Henry, his magnificent bass voice being
heard to special advantage in the opening
scene. As Lohengrin, the Knight of the
Holy Grail, Charles Belmont's tenor was
delightful. The parts of Telramund and
the Herald were also nicely given by
Messrs. Rathjens and Knight. The costu-
ming and stage settings were very elaborate,
the dresses of Miss Juch in the closing
scenes being gorgeous and beautiful. A
broadened satin and heavy blue train with
veiling and trimmings, worn in the bridal
scene, was especially admired. The
orchestration deserves special mention—it
excelled anything heard in the Opera
House in a long time—and to Mr. Neuen-
dorf's excellent leadership it is mainly due.
The chorus work showed careful training,
the grand finale of the first act being
especially marked. Altogether, "Lohen-
grin," as produced, was the best grand
opera ever given in this city. The
audience that few left before the
orchestra had a few minutes before mid-
night.
