THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 17—11 p.m.—The dis-
tribution of pressure has changed little since
last night except over Lake Superior, where it
has decreased considerably. The weather,
with the exception of local showers in the
Qu'Appelle Valley, has been generally fine
everywhere.

Minimum and maximum temperatures:
Calgary, 40°-74°; Battleford, 44°-75°; Qu'Appelle, 48°-72°; Winnipeg, 50°-70°; Toronto, 55°-85°; Montreal, 62°-72°; Quebec, 45°-61°; Halifax, 40°-70°.

Local temperatures—Highest, 87°; lowest, 65°.

Toronto, Sept. 18—1 a.m.—The indications
for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region
covering the peninsula and as far east as
Belleville are: Fresh to strong southerly to

Lacour's two sons from drowning in a large
pond at Stratford.

Westminster Rink Wednesday was sat-
isfactory all round. The crowd was big,
the music splendid and everybody was pleased.
A three-mile race on roller skates proved
an enjoyable variation. There were six
starters and all did well, but John Connor
and Wm. Fitzpatrick gradually forged
ahead and were winners in their order
named. The first prize was a gold medal
and the second a silver medal, both given
by the Sons of England. The band will no
doubt be benefited.

Their First Convention.

The Letter-Carriers' Association of the
Dominion convened Tuesday and Wednesday
in Toronto for the first time. It has been
in existence for two years, and is progres-
sively well. The objects of the association
are the general welfare of postmen and the
formation of a benefit fund. After some
routine business officers were elected as fol-
lows: W. J. Mankey, president; A. Mc-
Morris, secretary-treasurer; W. Short,
London, first vice-president; C. Belyea,
St. John, N.B., second vice-president; W.
J. Cow, Winnipeg, third vice-president;
B. Fair, Ottawa, fourth vice-president.
Ottawa was chosen as the place of meeting
for the convention next year.

A Good Record.

The annual meeting of the Women's
Missions Society was held on Tuesday
afternoon in the church parlor of
Dundas Street Center. There was an
unusually large attendance of the members.
Mrs. Dickson presided and conducted the
devotional exercises. Reports of the work
of the year were submitted, showing a
gratifying state of membership and general
interest in the operations of the auxiliary.
A resolution of condolence to Mrs. W. L.
Graham and family was passed in view of
their recent bereavement in Mr. Graham's
death. The following officers were elected
for the ensuing year: President, Mrs. J. H.
Dickson; vice-presidents, Mesdames Hop-
kins, Anderson and Gunn; secretary, Mrs.
Boel; corresponding secretary, Mrs. J. H.
McMechan; treasurer, Mrs. Geo. Brown.
The auxiliary will be represented at the
annual meeting of the western branch to be
held in Ingersoll next month by the pres-
ident, corresponding secretary, Mesdames
Brown and Lawrance, with Mrs. Beal as
alternate. The amount raised during the
year by the auxiliary is \$104.04, and by the
Young Ladies' Circle \$226.27, making a
total of \$330.31.

BAD BOOKKEEPING.

The Fire Hall Extras Committee Re-
ports at Last—A Proper Business
Record was Not Kept.

After their futile attack on the special
Fire Hall Extras Committee got a quorum
together Wednesday afternoon. The alder-
men walked over to No. 1 station, climbed
to the top story and then descended gradu-
ally, closely scrutinizing the work done on
each flat. Then they returned to City Hall
committee room with their minds made up.
Ald. Skinner moved the following, which
carried unanimously:

"The committee beg to report that after
careful examination into the Central Fire
Hall extras we find that No. 3 Committee
of 1890 and the engineer failed to keep a
proper record of the various extras which
were done; but the committee is of the
opinion that the city has got full value for
all moneys expended, and we recommend
that hereafter no committee be allowed to
give orders for extra work on any contract
unless it first obtains the sanction of the
City Council."

Aldermen Taylor, Wilkey, O'Meara,
Skinner, J. Fitzgerald and the city en-
gineer were present.

Ex-Chairman Boyd, at the last meeting
of the committee, emphatically placed the
whole responsibility of ordering the extras
on the ex-engineer's shoulders. It will be
remembered that White Bros. contract
amounted to \$1,284, and their extras to
\$1,057.39. When they sent in their bill for
the whole amount it is said that Engineer
Tracy handed it back to them, asking that
the names of those ordering each extra
piece of work be placed on the account.

The result was as follows:

Extras ordered by Chairman Boyd..... 79.45
Extras ordered by engineer..... 39.41
Total extras ordered.....\$1,057.39
