The Montreal Herald makes a sensible plea for the simultaneous observance of Thanksgiving Day in the United States and Canada, owing to the intimate business relations between them. Surely no Canadian would be so bigoted as to refuse to eat turkey on the same day as his Yankee cousin?

A remarkable railway has just been constructed across the pit of lake of Trinidad, from which the asphalt for the streets of this city was obtained. The line is built on palm leaves, some of them 25 feet long. The wonderful lake, at first sight, appears to be an expanse of still water frequently interrupted by clumps of trees and shrubs. On approaching it it is found to consist of mineral pitch, containing numbers of crevices filled with water. The surface is not slippery nor sticky, and will bear any weight. It is about 100 acres in extent and occupies a bowl-like depression in a truncated cone on the side of a hill covered with tropical jungles. The cone consists of both asphalt and earth. A heavy stream of asphalt has overflowed to the sea, forming a barrier reef for a considerable distance. Some diggings have been pushed to 40 feet below the surface of the lake without finding bottom. There is a steady outflow towards the sea through the side of the cone. The Barber Company pays \$50,000 a year for the exclusive right to carry away asphalt from the lake. They work under a long lease, but there seems no risk of the supply giving out. It is a perpetual gusher.

Str William Hingston says he is making a great sacrifice in accepting the Conservative nomination in Montreal Center. He may be strongly confirmed in his opinion on election day.

A German periodical asserts that Venezuela is a queer country, and it gives figures to prove its statement. According to the last census, Venezuela had a population of 2,323,527; of the males, 1,043,189 were born in lawful wedlock, and 1,186,956 out of it; of the females, 356,876 could not write and 356,876 could not read. It would be just as well for the world if Venezuela were to agree that Great Britain retain control of the 40,000 square miles adjoining British Guiana about which there is dispute. British control could not certainly result in a worse exhibit than that given in these returns.

The Toronto Week entered on its thirteenth year of publication this week. It is a national journal which commands attention abroad as well as at home, and its contributors are among the leaders of thought in the Dominion. The Week has just one fault. It encourages the jingo element. The jingoes do enough harm without newspaper assistance.

Dr. Canniff, of Toronto, a leading United Empire Loyalist, discusses the future relations of Canada, Great Britain and the United States, with Principal Grant's recent declarations on

the subject as his text. Dr. Canniff puts it thus concisely: "There seems only one way of averting an ultimate conflict between England and the States with respect to Canada, as I pointed out some years ago as a possible event in the future (for which I was laughed at) and which is concisely stated by Principal Grant in his communication, namely, to obtain a moral union of the English-speaking race, commercial union based on free trade, a common tribunal and a common citizenship, if not more."

When Mr. Foster pleaded that his party should be judged by its principles, not its leaders, he was rather rough on his colleagues.

The great trouble in Turkey today, as for centuries, is that there is no security for life and property, and rich agricultural and mineral resources are thus not half turned to account in supporting the people. A citizen knows that the moment he shows he has property, he will be pounced upon either by official plunderers in the shape of tax collectors, or by thieves of a more ordinary stamp. Very often, every man in a district, from those charged with enforcing such order as there is, down to the lowest brigand, is in league to plunder the visitor, no matter to what country he belongs. If they can do so, without inflicting bodily harm, well and good; if not, the robbery will be accompanied by murder. The fate of Lenz the famous bicyclist, is a case in point. Lenz was a native of the United States who went on a trip around the world on his wheel. He passed through Canada in safety. He traveled through Japan, China, India, Persia, and had got as far as Turkey in Asia, when he disappeared. For months no trace of him could be had. Then secret detectives were set at work by his employers. They traced him to the vicinity of a typical Turkish village, and found that he had been murdered in the belief that he was rich. The murderers were very ordinary thieves, who shared up the belongings of the unfortunate wheelman with the men in authority, one of whom had claimed the rubber on the wheel as his share of the plunder, and at the time the detective was in the neighborhood was actually using it as part harness for his horse!

With men in authority ready, from the highest to the lowest, thus to connive at crime and robbery, and believing it to be most meritorious to rob and kill every Christian dog, can we wonder at the chaos that reigns in Turkey, or at the deplorable condition of the masses?

The first necessity to progress and prosperity is stable government and security for life and property. Turkey has them not.

England's Condition.

In a recent address at Montreal, Rev. Thomas Hall referred to his late tour through Great Britain. He noted how disinterested and pure in conduct were the British political leaders, and spoke of the present condition of the masses. He had gone to the old country with the expectation of finding the people honeycombed with the demon of poverty, anarchy and revolution. More-over he had visited the worst and poorest districts of the country with a view to see for himself. As a result he had returned to Montreal with the deep conviction that the reports of the state of things which had reached this country, was not only exaggerated, but largely and wickedly untrue. In proof of this he quoted statistics showing the increase of deposits in the savings banks, the class of houses occupied by the working people, the better condition of the labor market, state of wages and the general contentment of the people. Britain would be a worker's paradise but for the taxation incident to her huge war debt and the fact that a large idle class hangs on the back of the agriculturists, and endeavors to exact large profits from the industry which should go to the tiller of the soil. Even now British workers are better paid than continental workers in "protected" nations, and British women have a shorter day than those of any country in the world.

ANOTHER MILESTONE

Passed in the History of the Colborne Street Methodist Church.

Anniversary Concert Last Night—Large Attendance, Interesting Addresses and a Good Musical Programme—The Treasurer's Figures.

The passing of another milestone in the history of the Colborne Street Methodist Church was celebrated last night by a concert in the church, which attracted a very large crowd and proved a thoroughly enjoyable affair. Mr. Wm. Bowman occupied the chair, and in his opening address stated that he could speak at some length regarding the history of the congregation. He held in his hand a document which related to its existence some 35 years ago, when the congregation was very small. "But we had some ambition in those days," said Mr. Bowman, "and an eye to the future. Time after time the erection of a new church was agitated, but it was feared that such a step would be an injury to Methodism, on account of the close proximity of the North Street Church (old Queen's Avenue). In looking over certain documents, I find that Methodism has increased more than all the other denominations in the city, and what was the secret of our increase? Because we have gone into the highways and hedges, and planted our missions, and those missions have grown into churches and five missions in the city. I thank God for my connection with Methodism, and that I have seen it grow from small proportions to its present standing, but I regret that as a body we do not go together as unitary as some of our sister churches do. If we had gone forward on the principles laid down by John Wesley we would have annihilated the rum traffic long ago. John Wesley was a man who said what he meant, and there is one phase of his character I would like all to copy—that is, his cheerfulness. There is no use in repining. We have had the blues at times, there is no doubt, but always turn the best side out, and people will always think the best of you. May everything go favorably with Colborne Street Church during the coming year, is my earnest prayer."

Mr. W. D. Buckle presented the financial statement of the church for the year ending Dec. 1. The receipts included a balance from last year of \$3 99; anniversary collections, \$45 49; proceeds from anniversary concert, \$39 25; ordinary collections, \$294 67; pew rents, \$547 72; old subscriptions, \$41; subscriptions to trust board, \$10 94; Ladies' Aid, for music, \$88; rent of school room and sundries, \$66 60; loan for payment of interest, \$150, making a total of \$1,387 66. The expenditures were \$547 25 for interest on the mortgage; \$402 30 for the choir, including salaries of organist and leader; fuel, \$110 95; gas and water rates, \$65; insurance, \$59 60; sexton's salary, \$150; printing, \$11 50; organ blower and sundries, \$29 97, leaving a balance of \$11 09. Since the accounts were audited, \$167 85 had been received. The assets of the church were placed at \$18,593 04, as follows: Value of property, \$18,114; music, etc., \$248; old subscriptions, \$50; pew rents, \$110; and the balance of \$11 04. The liabilities are only \$8,552 28—\$8,000 being on the mortgage, on which the arrears in interest amount to \$454 95. The assets exceed the liabilities by \$10,040 76. During the year the Epworth League (in addition to the amounts mentioned above) has paid out \$65 for the church boulevard, \$183 for the fixing of class rooms in the Sunday school gallery.

The evening's musical programme was an excellent one, and included numbers by the church choir, under the leadership of Mr. H. Ruthven McDonald, and quartets and solos by well-known local talent. Interesting addresses were also delivered by Rev. James Allen, of Toronto (who was stationed in the old Pall Mall Street Church nearly a quarter of a century ago), and Rev. A. Russell, M.A., pastor of the Wellington Street Church, and chairman of the London district. The programme was as follows:

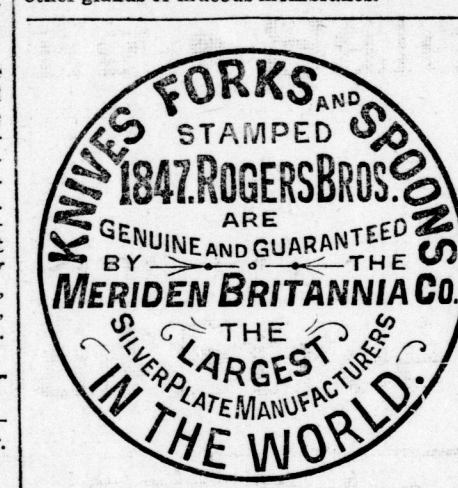
