Increased Earnings of the Grand
Trunk and C. P. R.

The C. P. R., owing to increase of
business, have established new night
telegraph offices at Burlington and
Indian River, both in the Smith's Falls
division.

unloading.

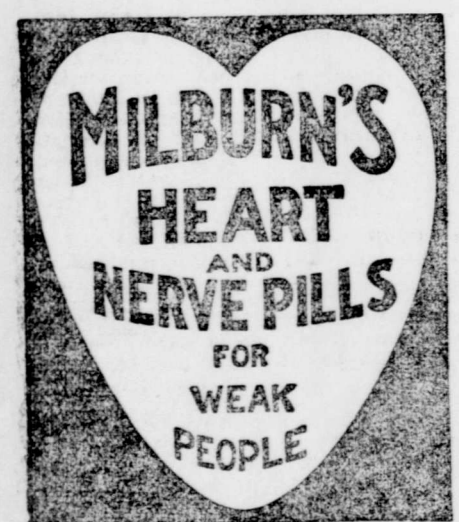
A smash-up occurred on the G. T.

systems, Sept. 8 to 14, 1907, \$207,067;
for 1906, \$221,580—Increase, \$36,215. The
C. P. R., from Sept. 1 to 14, 1907, \$455,
000; 1906, \$428,000—Increase, \$27,000.

ONTARIO'S HEALTH.

The monthly report issued by the
Provincial Board of Health shows
that out of 745 municipalities in On-
tario, 406 made returns for the month
of August. The total deaths from the
several contagious diseases for a popu-
lation of 1,286,000, were 139. The city
of Chatham made no return to the
department. Of the twelve cities making
returns, Stratford reported the highest
deaths from contagious diseases. Of
the 40 counties reporting, Lennox and
Addington and Prince Edward re-
ported no deaths from contagious diseases.

arm.

Tom McCarthy, who is wanted by
Y. O. der Ahe to manage St. Louis, has
grown so stout that it is doubtful if he
will ever play ball again. But his
well known "baseball brain" is as clear
as ever.

The National League men have had
considerable correspondence of late on
a proposition for a rule calling for the
suspension of rowdy players for from
one to five days, the umpires to receive
power to inflict such punishment.

President Young says that the sea-

brilliant in the history of the game,
so far as the pitchers' work goes.

CRICKET.

A DRAW AT PHILADELPHIA.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 21.—The crick-
et match between an English eleven
captained by P. F. Warner, and 22
"colts," selected from various cricket
clubs in Philadelphia, ended yesterday
in a drawn game. When stumps were
drawn Saturday the "colts" had scored
108 five wickets in their first inning, and
148 runs in their second. The Englishmen
had scored 148 runs in their first in-
ning. Play was resumed yesterday.
When the score had reached 240 for
12 wickets, the "colts" closed their in-
ning. With 20 runs necessary to win,
the visitors started their second inning,
but after the loss of five wickets for
12 runs the game was declared a draw.
Capt. Warner did the best batting for
the Englishmen, scoring 56 runs. The
attendance was small.

SENSATION AT BERLIN.

Berlin, Ont., Sept. 21.—A serious
stabbing affray occurred here late
Saturday night on Elgin street. An al-
legation took place between Mr. and
Mrs. Jossinghaus, in which the latter
seized a butcher knife and stabbed her
husband in the side near the heart.

As soon as possible the man made
his way to the residence of Dr. Hiett,
who examined and attended to the
wound. The instrument used is an
ordinary butcher knife. It is yet un-
certain as to the outcome of this rash
act.

The couple have not got along very
well together. The woman, it is claim-
ed, is the cause of the disagreement.

BURIAL OF ENGINEER WARREN.

St. Thomas, Sept. 21.—The remains
of Mr. Richard Warren, engineer, for-
merly of the C. P. R., killed in a col-
lision near Chippewa, Wis., on Friday,
arrived here Sunday night and were
buried yesterday morning. The pall-
bearers were Messrs. Geo. W. Wil-
liamson, Geo. McCarthy, H. Turn-
penny, G. L. Fraser and J. Balfry.

There were fifty people killed in the
wreck in which Engineer Warren lost
his life. Through a mistake in orders
two freight trains met in a curve and
together with terrible force. The dead
were: Engineer Warren, Engineer
Smith, Fireman Smiley Brakeman
Miller, and an unknown man riding
between cars. Two brakemen were
seriously injured. The passengers in
the caboose were slightly injured.

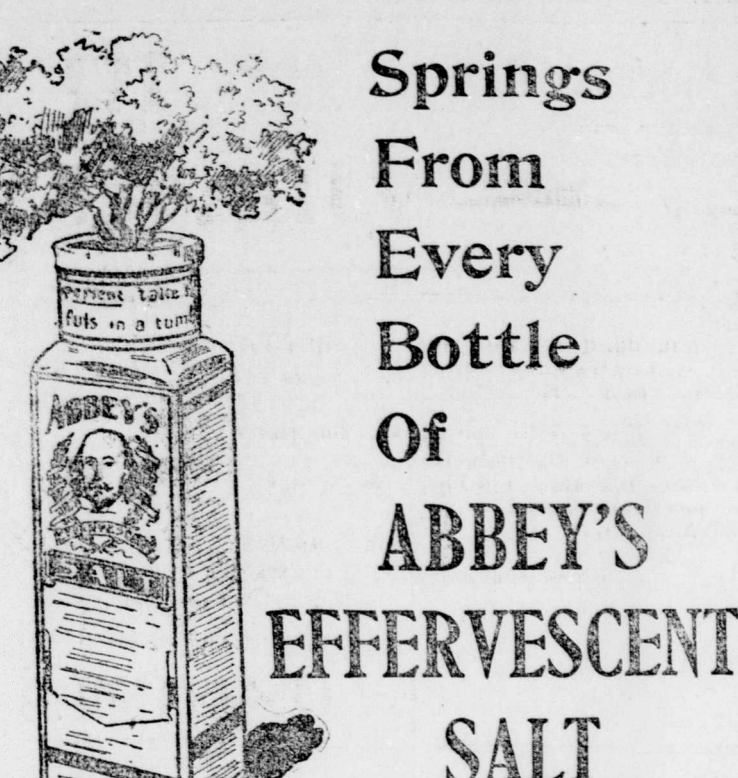
