FORT CANADA. Gunner Adam Armstrong, writing home to Kingston, Ont., on Aug. 13, says that for two months previous to writing, C battery was at Rustenberg with Gen. Baden-Powell. "We built a splendid fort," he writes, "one that will stand to the memory of C battery for ages if it is not destroyed. We called it Fort Canada, and engraved on the largest stone we could find the words: 'Fort Canada, 1900.' It was a complete bomb-proof shelter, with pits for the men, observation tower for C battery officers, bastions for the guns, and shelter pits for all our horses. It beats anything of its kind I have yet seen in South Africa." C battery is with Gens. Hamilton and Mahon's column.

Daring and Deep.

HOW CANADIANS GOT TWO GUNS. A belated report of Gen. Hutton to Lord Roberts, describing the operations of the Canadian Mounted Infantry around Pretoria in June, says that he (Gen. Hutton) could not allow so difficult and dangerous a duty to pass without bringing the detachment to notice. The general especially commends Lieut. F. V. Young, Manitoba Dragoons; Sergt. E. Purdom, Duke of York's Own Hussars, and Sergt. R. H. Ryan, King's Canadian Hussars, for their intrepid conduct. The incident occurred at Klip Kop,

where a number of the enemy were in laager. Gen. Hutton had with him a brigade of mounted infantry, a bat-tery of artillery and a battalion. It was deemed essential to reconnoiter the force at Klip Kop, and to Lieut. Young and fifteen others the task was assigned. Twelve of these were Remington's Scouts. Young and his men set out and crossed the Klip River so as to reach the kop by the rear. After fol-lowing the east bank of the river for two or three miles, the party arrived at Two Farms. Eight Boers were found here, and were promptly disarmed. After crossing the river, Young and his men found that they had got in behind of constant and homesteads.
