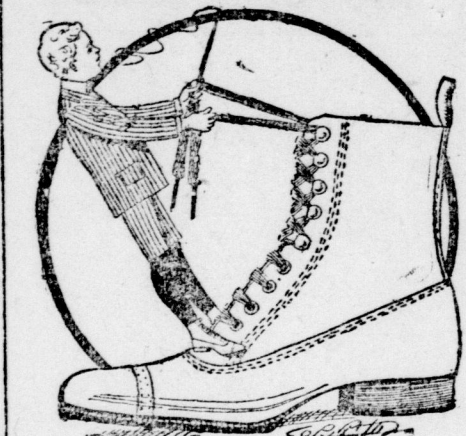

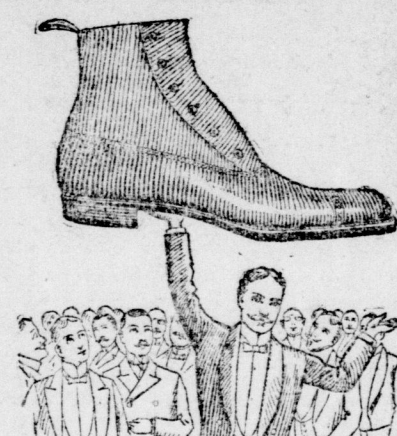

Gen. Roberts Going Home

Her Majesty Will Inspect Colonial Volunteers.

Commandant Botha Said to Have Surrendered—Missing

Strathconas Join Their Regiment—Illustrations of

Canadian Pluck—More Wounded—Father

O'Leary Appreciated.

New York, Sept. 18.—A large part of the Rustenburg commando has surrendered, and there are reports that Commandant Botha has given himself up, the London correspondent of the Tribune cables, relative to the South African war.

FATHER O'LEARY. The Countess of Dudley has offered Rev. Father O'Leary, chaplain in the first contingent of Canadians, who has been invalided to England, his choice of a list of houses for his use, or apartments at any hotel in England or abroad, while recruiting his health. Father O'Leary has won golden opinions in South Africa.

LORD ROBERTS' RETURN. London, Sept. 18.—The Pietermaritzburg correspondent of the Daily Mail announces that Lord Roberts will start for England about Oct. 3. This time there is little doubt of the genuineness of the report of his early return. Some troops will also be coming back, and the elections will thus be excellently timed by the government to take advantage of the national fever over a successful war.

THE QUEEN AND THE COLONIALS. Representatives of the colonial volunteers in South Africa will visit England on their return, the Queen desiring to inspect them. All the war correspondents who participated in the South African campaign will receive medals in recognition of their services. The Canadian newspapermen, as well as all colonial correspondents, who followed their regiments to the front, will be included in the list.

REITZ WILL EMIGRATE. F. W. Reitz, secretary of the aboriginal South African Republic, is going to Paris, according to the Pretoria correspondent of the Daily Mail, from which point he will proceed to the United States, where he will probably remain.

KRUGER MUST KEEP QUIET. The Italian government has decided that if President Kruger touches at the Italian port he shall be treated simply as a private citizen. This announcement is made in anticipation of Oom Paul sailing from Lorenzo Marques for Europe.

The Berlin Vossische Zeitung points out that the singular orders "given by the Portuguese government to the governor of Mozambique, authorizing the departure of Mr. Kruger for Europe, permit Mr. Kruger to sail only for a European port, adding: "The government, in so doing, goes beyond its powers. Doubtless Lisbon is acting under pressure from Great Britain, but we are, presumably, that Mr. Kruger is going to the United States."

THE INCIDENT OCCURRED AT KLIP KOP, where a number of the enemy were in laager. Gen. Hutton had with him a brigade of mounted infantry, a battery of artillery and a battalion.
