# Boers Bombarded Ladysmith Again

One Shell Kills a Captain and Wounds Seven Lieutenants.

Party of Boers Cut Off by the Rising of the Tugela -- Colonial Authorities Taking Every Precaution to Curb Dutch Disloyalty.

Boers Repulsed at Victoria-Inhabitants of Kimberley Send a New Year's Greeting to the Queen-Lord Salisbury's Son Cecil Wounded at Mafeking.

graph message has been received by way of Weeman from Ladysmith, dated, Wednesday, Dec. 27 .- "The Boers are actually bombarding the town. One shell struck the Devonshire mess tent, killing Capt. Dalzel and wounding seven lieutenants, Dent, Tuisa, Tringman, Caffyn, Bryne, Scafe and Kane."

A later dispatch from Ladysmith, by way of Weenen, dated Friday, Dec. 29, says: "All well. The Boers have been firing plugged shells, containing plum pudding and the compliments of the season. They are fortifying their positions and are evidently determined to make a firm stand."

METHUEN'S POSITION UNCHANG-ED.

"Hear unofficially from Sterkstrom that a British reconnoissance, seven miles north of Dordrecht, engaged su-

perior forces and was obliged to retire on Dordrecht." BOERS CUT OFF.

Frere Camp, Dec. 30.—Saturday—Owing to the flooding of the Tugela River a large party of Boers have been cut off from the south side. They are reported to be in the hills to the right of Chieveley.

Cape Town, Thursday, Dec. 28 .- The colonial authorities are using every precaution to prevent an insurrection on the part of the disloyal Dutch in Cape Colony and to suppress a rising if it should occur. Everywhere the British colonists are being organized into home guards drilled, armed and ready to act in their respective localities should armed Dutch colonials

The theory is that the British homestaying colonials should be fully prepared to cope with the Dutch colonials without the aid of regulars.

UNITED ACTION PREVENTED. The alertness of the British makes united action on the part of the pro-Boer residents difficult. Unable to act openly, they slip away singly or in small groups, to join the enemy's forces. The authorities have been informed of many centers of agitation. which it is considered undesirable to particularize; but there is nothing like concerted action apparent over wide

The case of M. Michan, solicitor to the De Beers Company, who is accused of treason, acquires increased import-ance, as he has been transferred from the custody of the civil authorities here to the military authorities at De Aar. His high position causes the Dutch to watch his case keenly. RAILWAY WRECKERS DRIVEN
